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ANNUAL REPORT.

To THE MINISTER FOR JUSTICE.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit my Annual Report on Crime for the year ended the 31st December, 1956.

PART I.

INDICTABLE OFFENCES.

The number of indictable offences which were reported or became known to the *Gárda Síochána* in 1956 was 12,782, which figure is 1,251 more than the number in 1955. The increase is recorded mainly in offences of Housebreaking and Larceny.

Proceedings were taken in 6,839 cases and in an additional 851 cases, the offenders were detected, but no proceedings are shown, giving a total of 7,690 detections, which is 60% of the offences recorded.

COMPARISON WITH PREVIOUS YEAR.

In the following table, the number of offences recorded in each offence group and the number and percentage of detections in 1955 and 1956 are given.

PERSONS PROCEEDED AGAINST.

The number of persons proceeded against for the commission of indictable offences in 1956, was 6,620, of whom 5,986 were males and 634 females. The number of persons convicted was 3,244 and the charges against a further 2,261 were held proved

and the Probation of Offenders' Act was applied. The proceedings against 356 are pending.

GROUP I.—OFFENCES AGAINST THE PERSON.

Included in this group are offences of Murder, Manslaughter, Wounding, Assault, Intimidation, Cruelty to and Abandoning Children and Sexual Offences.

Comparative figures of offences recorded in this group in years 1951 to 1956 are given in the following table:—

MURDER—OF PERSONS AGED ABOVE ONE YEAR.

Three murders of persons aged above one year were recorded in 1956, and proceedings were taken in each case.

Brief particulars are:—

Dublin Metropolitan Area.—On 21st January, 1956, arising out of an altercation in their home, a 20 year old youth was fatally stabbed in the chest with a knife by his 18 year old brother. The offender was found guilty of Murder and was ordered to be detained during the pleasure of the Government.

Dublin Metropolitan Area.—On 18th April, 1956, the dead body of a young woman was found in a city street by a milk roundsman. A Postmortem examination of the body revealed that death was caused by air embolism which occurred during an illegal operation to procure an abortion. An arrest was made in the case, and the accused, a middle-aged nurse, was convicted of Murder and was sentenced to death. The sentence was later commuted to Penal Servitude for life.

Co. Kildare.—On 23rd August, 1956, the dead body of a 53 year old widow, farmer, was found in a burning bed in her home. A Postmortem examination of the body revealed that death was due to shock resulting from extensive burns, probably sustained while the deceased was, through some cause, unconscious. A 28 year old farm labourer was arrested and charged with her Murder. He admitted that he broke into the house, and said he struck the woman on the head with a stick. Sufficient evidence to put him on trial was not obtained and at the District Court, "Informations were refused" on the Murder charge.

In the year 1955, three crimes of Murder—of persons aged above one year, were recorded also.

MURDER—OF INFANTS AGED ONE YEAR AND UNDER.

No crime of Murder of Infants was recorded in 1956. One such crime was recorded in 1955.

INFANTICIDE.

One crime of Infanticide was recorded in 1956. Brief particulars are :—

Co. Tipperary.—On 11th November, 1956, a 30 year old domestic servant gave birth to a male infant in her employer's home and concealed the body in a paper bag in her room where it was found by her employer. A Postmortem examination revealed that death was caused by external pressure on the infant's neck. The mother was arrested and charged with Murder. At the Circuit Court, she pleaded guilty to Infanticide. Her plea was accepted and she was sentenced to six months' imprisonment with Hard Labour, not to be enforced if she entered into recognizances to keep the peace for two years. The recognizances were entered into and she was discharged.

One crime of Infanticide was recorded in 1955, also.

ATTEMPT TO MURDER.

No crime of Attempt to Murder was recorded in 1956, nor in 1955.

THREATS, CONSPIRACY, ETC., TO MURDER.

Two crimes of Threatening to Murder were recorded in 1956.

Brief particulars are :—

Dublin Metropolitan Area.—On 17th April, 1956, a letter, written by a tenant and complaining of her landlord's failure to stamp rent receipts, was received by the Revenue Commissioners. The letter also contained a threat to kill the landlord, in the words: "If he comes in here to throw me out I will shoot him dead and also put the butcher's knife to the handle in his pot belly." The writer of the letter was arrested and was returned for trial. While awaiting trial, she was convicted of the Murder of another person.

Dublin Metropolitan Area.—On 18th October, 1956, a building contractor received, by registered post, a letter written in block capitals, containing the words, "Beware—you, dead body will be found near your doorstep." It is believed the letter was

written by a former employee of the injured party's, whom he had dismissed for dishonesty. The suspect left the country.

Two crimes of Threatening to Murder were recorded in 1955, also.

MANSLAUGHTER (OTHER THAN TRAFFIC FATALITIES).

Three crimes of Manslaughter (other than Traffic Fatalities) were recorded in 1956. Proceedings were taken in each case.

Brief particulars are :—

Co. Donegal.—On 8th June, 1956, at 10.30 p.m., an itinerant demanded admittance to a licensed premises. On being refused, he broke a window, whereupon the licensee fired a shot from a shot-gun, through the window, which struck the itinerant in the chest and killed him instantly. The licensee was arrested and charged with Manslaughter. At the Circuit Court he was found "Not Guilty" and was discharged.

Co. Kildare.—On 12th September, 1956, at 10.40 p.m., an altercation took place outside a licensed premises during which a 59 year old farmer was struck, with his fist, by a 38 year old fitter. The farmer fell to the ground and sustained injuries to his head which resulted in his death at 9.30 a.m. on the following day. At the Circuit Court, the accused was found "Not Guilty" by direction of the trial Judge.

Dublin Metropolitan Area.—On 17th November, 1956, at 10.20 p.m., a member of the Defence Forces was challenged to fight outside a licensed premises. He was then assaulted, knocked to the pavement and sustained injuries which resulted in his death on the following day. His assailant was arrested and charged, and at the Circuit Court was sentenced to 12 months' imprisonment with Hard Labour, not to be enforced if he entered into recognizances to keep the peace for two years.

Three crimes of Manslaughter (other than Traffic Fatalities) were recorded in 1955, also.

MANSLAUGHTER (TRAFFIC FATALITIES).

Twenty-nine crimes of Manslaughter (Traffic Fatalities) were recorded in 1956. Proceedings were taken in all cases but in none of the 27 cases disposed of was the accused convicted. Two cases are yet pending.

Thirty-six crimes were recorded in 1955.

WOUNDING, ETC. (FELONIES).

Thirteen crimes of Wounding and other acts endangering life were recorded in 1956, which is one more than the number in 1955.

Proceedings were taken in eleven cases within the year and in a further case, the offender was detected, but no proceedings are shown.

Convictions were recorded in five cases and two cases are yet pending.

ASSAULT, WOUNDING, ETC. (MISDEMEANOURS).

A total of 254 crimes of Assault, Wounding, etc., was recorded in 1956, which is seven more than the number in year 1955. Proceedings were taken in 249 cases and in one other case, the offender was known, but no proceedings are shown.

In 190 cases, the accused persons were convicted and in a further 34 cases, the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders' Act was applied.

Ten cases are shown still pending.

ENDANGERING RAILWAY PASSENGERS.

Seven crimes of Endangering Railway Passengers were recorded in 1956, as compared with one crime in 1955. Six of those crimes, in which the offenders were traced, were committed by juveniles who placed stones on the railway lines and interfered with signal lights. The undetected case, in which stones were thrown through a carriage window and a passenger's face cut by flying glass, was also believed to be the act of juveniles.

INTIMIDATION.

Eleven crimes of Intimidation were recorded in 1956, of which nine were Intimidation by Threatening Letters, etc. Proceedings were taken in three cases.

In 1955, nine crimes were recorded and five were Intimidation by Threatening Letters.

SEXUAL OFFENCES AGAINST FEMALES.

A total of 139 Sexual Offences against females was recorded in 1956, which is seven less than the number in 1955.

GROUP II.—OFFENCES AGAINST PROPERTY WITH VIOLENCE.

Offences of Burglary, Housebreaking, Robbery and Malicious Injuries to Property, are included in this Group.

The total in this group in 1956 was 2,695, which is 370 more than the number in 1955. Proceedings were taken in 1,845 cases, and convictions recorded in 1,124. In a further 454, the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders' Act applied. 159 cases are shown pending.

HOUSEBREAKING.

There was an increase of 384 in the number of offences relating to Housebreaking in 1956 as compared with 1955, due principally to an increase of 323 in offences of Breaking into Shops, etc., of which 1,408 were recorded in 1956. Offences of Breaking into Dwellinghouses numbered 941 in 1956 as compared with 932 in 1955.

Comparative figures for total offences relating to Housebreaking and the number and percentage of cases in which proceedings were taken in years 1951 to 1956 are given in the following table:—

ROBBERY.

Twenty-seven crimes of Robbery and Assaults with Intent to Rob were recorded in 1956. In two cases firearms were alleged to have been used, brief particulars of which are:—

(1) On 2nd October, 1956, two masked men, one of whom was armed with a revolver, entered the Branch Office of a bank in Co. Dublin, held up the cashier and took away £460 in notes. A shot was discharged in the office as they were leaving. They escaped in a motor car which they had, earlier that day, stolen. Two youths were arrested later on the same day and charged with this and other crimes. They were each sentenced to five years' Penal Servitude. Eleven crimes, including Robbery, House-breaking and Larceny, all but one of which were committed within the preceding month, were charged against them.

(2) On 12th December, 1956, a Co. Dublin farmer, who was driving his motor car along the public road, stopped in response to a signal for a lift from a youth. The youth got into the car and immediately produced a pistol and ordered the farmer from the car which he then drove away. On the same day, after a chase by a police car, the youth was arrested. He was convicted and ordered to be detained for two years in Reformatory School.

Of the 25 cases in which firearms were not used, the most serious cases were :—

(1) *Co. Dublin.*—On 2nd June, 1956, a young man entered a shop in a North County village, struck down a 74 year old widow with a tractor spanner and made off with £6 16s., in cash, and 20 cigarettes. The culprit was arrested and was sentenced to seven years' Penal Servitude.

(2) On 30th June, 1956, as three girls, employees of a Dublin City bookmaker, were about to leave the premises in which they were working, with the day's takings, they were ordered back by a masked man carrying a long butcher's knife. He ordered one of them to open the cash case from which he took £79 1s. 3d. He also took £5 19s. from her handbag. He then tied up and gagged the girls and made off. A 34 year old dock worker was arrested and charged with the crime. He was sentenced to two years' imprisonment with Hard Labour.

(3) On 23rd August, 1956, at 10 p.m., a female garage employee had just locked up the garage in the Dublin Metropolitan area and was about to mount her bicycle with the day's takings when she was pushed from behind and thrown to the ground. The cash case containing £91 2s. 9d., was taken. The assailant was believed to be a young man who had earlier been seen in the vicinity. No arrest has been made in the case.

Proceedings were taken in 18 cases and convictions were recorded in 14 cases. In a further 3 cases, the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders' Act was applied.

In 1955, the number of crimes recorded was 40, in none of which were firearms used.

ARSON AND OTHER MALICIOUS INJURY TO PROPERTY.

A total of 99 crimes was recorded under this heading in 1956, of which 54 were Arson, 5 Killing or Maiming Cattle, 6 were Malicious Use, etc., of Explosives and 34 other Malicious Injuries, as compared with 48 cases of Arson, 6 Killing or Maiming Cattle, no case of Malicious Use, etc., of Explosives and 43 other Malicious Injuries to Property in 1955.

Proceedings were taken in 51 cases in 1956, and convictions were recorded in 24. In an additional 14, the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders' Act was applied.

GROUP III.—OFFENCES AGAINST PROPERTY WITHOUT VIOLENCE.

Included in this group are offences of Larceny, Embezzlement, Obtaining Goods, etc., by False Pretences, Frauds and Receiving Stolen Goods.

The number of offences recorded in this group in 1956 was 9,365, which is 810 more than the number in 1955. In Larcenies alone, there was an increase of 747.

Proceedings were taken in 4,384 cases in 1956, and convictions numbered 2,146. In an additional 1,559, the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders' Act was applied. 250 cases are shown as still pending.

Of the total Larcenies recorded in 1956, 5,652 or almost 64% were recorded in the Dublin Metropolitan Area, as compared with 5,171, also 64%, in 1955, and 5,503 or over 67% in 1954.

EMBEZZLEMENT.

Forty-five offences of Embezzlement were recorded in 1956, which is 12 more than the number in 1955. In the Dublin Metropolitan Area, 9 offences were recorded in 1956, as compared with 19 in 1955.

Proceedings were taken in 33 cases, and in 13 cases convictions were recorded. In a further nine cases, the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders' Act was applied. Four cases are shown pending.

OBTAINING GOODS, ETC., BY FALSE PRETENCES.

There was a decrease of 35 in the number of offences recorded in 1956, the total being 203 as compared with 238 in 1955. Sixty-nine offences were recorded in the Dublin Metropolitan Area in 1956, which is five more than the number recorded in 1955.

Proceedings were taken in 141 cases, and convictions recorded in 85 cases. In a further 30 cases, the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders' Act was applied. 13 cases are shown pending. In an additional 46 cases, the offenders were detected, but no proceedings are shown.

FRAUDS.

Forty-two offences relating to Frauds were recorded in 1956, 13 of which were committed in the Dublin Metropolitan Area. In 1955, a total of 34 offences was recorded, of which 16 were recorded in the Dublin Metropolitan Area.

Proceedings were taken in 33 cases in 1956, and convictions numbered 14. In an additional 4 cases, the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders' Act was applied. Seven cases are shown pending.

GROUP IV.—OFFENCES NOT INCLUDED IN FOREGOING GROUPS.

Included in this Group are Offences of Forgery and Uttering, Perjury, Bribery, Riot and Unlawful Assembly, Offences against Public Decency, Offences under the Coinage Acts, Attempting to Commit Suicide, Offences under the Treason Act and Offences against the State Act, and other Indictable Offences not included in Groups I, II or III.

A total of 180 offences was recorded in this Group in 1956, which is 54 more than the number in 1955. The increase is due principally to an increase of 39 in offences of Forgery and Uttering, of which 116 were recorded in 1956.

Nineteen offences of Attempting to Commit Suicide were recorded in 1956, which is six more than the number in 1955.

Proceedings were taken in 138 cases in this Group in 1956, and convictions numbered 82. In a further 40 cases, the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders' Act was applied. Seven cases are shown pending.

ORGANISED CRIMES OF VIOLENCE.

Twelve organised crimes of violence were recorded in 1956, eight of which were of an agrarian and four of a political nature.

Of the eight agrarian crimes, five were committed in one area in Co. Kerry, three of which were "Sending Threatening Letters", one "Malicious Spiking of a Meadow" and one a serious Assault. Three of those crimes were committed against a young farmer who had purchased portion of an estate, concerning the division of which there was local agitation. The remaining three agrarian crimes were committed in one area in Co. Offaly. In one case a heifer was shot dead and a water-pump damaged and in the remaining two cases, houses in the course of construction were maliciously damaged.

Of the four crimes of a political nature, two were committed in the Dublin Metropolitan Area, one of which was an attempt to destroy by explosives, an equestrian monument in Phoenix Park, and the other an attempt, also by explosives, to destroy a War Memorial Cenotaph at Islandbridge. The remaining two crimes were committed in the Border Area in one of which

rifle shots were fired into an Éire Customs Hut, and in the other, four young men were found in unlawful possession of firearms in a disused house.

In 1955, nine organised crimes of violence were recorded, eight of which were agrarian and one political.

VALUE OF PROPERTY STOLEN AND RECOVERED.

The total value of property reported as stolen in 1956, was £140,235, of which property valued £46,616 was recovered.

The value of property stolen in offences against property with violence, *i.e.*, Burglary, Housebreaking and Sacrilege, was £51,613, of which, property valued £18,465 was recovered. In offences against property without violence, *i.e.*, Larcenies, the value of property reported as stolen was £88,622, of which, property valued £28,151 was recovered.

In comparison with the value of property stolen in 1955, there was a decrease of £5,143 in the total value stolen in 1956, of which £2,033 was in respect of offences against property with violence and £3,110 in offences against property without violence.

PERSONS CHARGED WITH INDICTABLE OFFENCES AND FINALLY DEALT WITH.

The number of persons charged with the commission of indictable offences in 1956, was 6,620—5,986 males and 634 females.

The number finally dealt with was 6,264, and the guilt of 5,505 was established, 3,244 by conviction and 2,261 dealt with under the Probation of Offenders' Act, 1907.

PERSONS CONVICTED OF INDICTABLE OFFENCES.

The number of persons convicted of indictable offences in 1956, was 3,244—3,018 males and 226 females, representing 49% of the total persons charged.

The number convicted by Courts of Summary Jurisdiction was 3,001—2,784 males and 217 females, and the number convicted by Circuit and Higher Courts was 243—234 males and 9 females.

The following table contains comparative figures of persons convicted, by age groups, and the percentage which each age group forms of the total persons convicted, in years 1951 to 1956.

PERSONS DEALT WITH UNDER PROBATION OF OFFENDERS' ACT.

The number of persons against whom the charges were held proved and dealt with under the Probation of Offenders' Act, 1907, without conviction, in 1956, was 2,261 or 34% of the total persons charged, of which 1,968 were males and 293 females.

In the following table, comparative figures of persons, by age groups, dealt with under the Probation Act and the percentage of persons so dealt with in years 1951 to 1956, are given:—

INDICTABLE OFFENCES CLEARED UP IN YEAR 1956.

The number of indictable offences cleared up in 1956 was 7,719, details of which are given in Columns 3 and 17 of Appendix A (1) and Column 2 of Appendix G (2). The percentage of offences cleared up in 1956 in relation to the number recorded was over 60%. In year 1955, the percentage was 61%.

The incidence of indictable offences and detections in years 1946 to 1956 is shown in Graphical Form in Appendix A (3).

DETECTIONS IN INDICTABLE OFFENCES RECORDED IN YEAR 1955.

During 1956, detections were made in 29 indictable offences which were committed in 1955 but were not detected in that year. Convictions were recorded in 16 cases and in an additional 8 the charges were held proved and the Probation Act was applied.

Details are given in Appendix G (2).

INDICTABLE OFFENCES—RESULTS OF PROCEEDINGS PENDING FROM YEAR 1955.

In Appendix A (1) to report for 1955, proceedings were shown pending in 333 cases. Proceedings are still shown pending in 31 cases and one has been struck out of records. Of the 301 cases dealt with, convictions were recorded in 79 and in a further 177 the charges were held proved and the Probation Act was applied.

Details are given in Appendix G (1).

PART II.

JUVENILES CHARGED WITH INDICTABLE OFFENCES.

The number of juveniles charged with indictable offences and dealt with in 1956 was 2,467 and the number of offences charged against them was 2,378.

In 1955 the number of juveniles charged and finally dealt with was 2,138 for 2,364 offences.

In addition to juveniles charged, a number of juveniles were, with the consent of the Law Officers, cautioned by the Garda for the commission of minor indictable offences where the injured party did not object to such a course and the caution was appreciated by child and parent or guardian. The number of juveniles cautioned in 1956 was 619.

PERCENTAGE OF JUVENILE OFFENDERS CHARGED IN RELATION TO TOTAL PERSONS CHARGED WITH INDICTABLE OFFENCES.

The number of juveniles dealt with in the Courts in 1956—2,467—formed 37% of the total persons charged with indictable offences, as compared with 36% in 1955 and 34% in 1954.

The high percentage of juveniles charged in relation to other offenders is attributable to the fact that the detection percentage in offences committed by juveniles is high, whereas in offences committed by adults it may be said to be low, in comparison.

Offences committed by juveniles, usually within their home locality, are mostly of a minor nature, in which petty cash, sweets, toys, etc., are stolen and frequently shared with friends,

thus advertising their misdeeds. Their comrades, too, will often implicate them and when questioned in the presence of their parents or guardians, the offenders will, as a rule, admit their guilt, whereas adult offenders plan their offences with care, have set channels for disposal of stolen property and will not admit guilt unless confronted with conclusive evidence. Again, a number of adult offenders escape prosecution for lack of evidence, though known to the Police as offenders.

OFFENCES CHARGED AGAINST JUVENILES.

Of the total juveniles charged and dealt with in 1956, 955 (almost 39%) were charged with Housebreaking, 27 (1%) were charged with Burglary, and 1,301 (almost 53%) were charged with Larceny.

JUVENILE OFFENDERS RELEASED UNDER THE PROBATION OF OFFENDERS ACT.

The number of juvenile offenders who were released under the Probation of Offenders Act, 1907, in 1956 was 1,420 or almost 58% of the number charged.

Of the 2,467 juveniles dealt with in the Courts in 1956, 1,710 or 69% were charged for the first time, of which 1,114 or 65% were released under the Probation Act.

The number charged for the second time was 486 or 20% of the total, of which 230 or 47% were released under the Probation Act, 62 for the first time and 168 for the second time.

The number charged for the third time was 165 or 7% of the total, of which 53 or 33% were released under the Probation Act, 7 for the first time, 21 for the second time and 25 for the third time.

The number charged for the fourth time or oftener was 106 or 4% of the total, of which 23 or 22% were released under the Probation of Offenders' Act, one for the first time, three for the second time, seven for the third time and twelve for the fourth time or oftener.

Details are given in Appendix F (2).

The statistical features of juvenile crime shown in this report are compiled from information given in a special form which is completed by the investigating Police Officers, on the termination of proceedings against each juvenile charged with an indictable offence and may be accepted as reliable.

PART III.

NON-INDICTABLE OFFENCES—PERSONS PROSECUTED.

The number of persons prosecuted for non-indictable offences in 1956 was 94,370, which is 4,983 less than the number in 1955. This decrease is due, principally, to a decrease of 3,263 in prosecutions for offences under the Road Traffic Act, 1933, and a decrease of 1,512 in prosecutions for Keeping Unlicensed Dogs.

The number of persons convicted was 70,029, of which 872 were sent to prison without the option of a fine and 69,047 were fined. In addition to the persons convicted, the charges against 18,051 persons were held proved and the Probation Act was applied.

ASSAULTS.

A total of 1,296 persons were prosecuted in 1956 for Assaults, *viz.*, 1,153 for Common Assault, 111 for Assaults on Gárdaí and 32 for Aggravated Assaults.

The number convicted was 750 of which 165 were sent to prison without the option of a fine and 535 were fined. The charges against an additional 260 persons were held proved and the Probation of Offenders' Act was applied.

In 1955, 1,129 persons were prosecuted, *viz.*, 936 for Common Assault, 136 for Assault on Gárdaí and 57 for Aggravated Assaults.

CRUELTY TO ANIMALS.

219 persons were prosecuted in 1956 for offences of Cruelty to Animals, and 141 were convicted. Two were sent to prison without the option of a fine and 138 were fined. The charges against a further 43 were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders' Act.

In 1955 the number of persons prosecuted was 199. The number convicted was 139 of which 6 were sent to prison without the option of a fine and 132 were fined. 27 were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders' Act.

DOGS—OFFENCES IN RELATION TO LICENSING OF.

There was a decrease of 1,512 in the number of persons prosecuted in 1956, for Keeping Unlicensed Dogs, as compared with the number in 1955, the totals being 4,157 and 5,669 respectively. The number convicted in 1956 was 1,942, all of whom were fined. An additional 1,823 were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders' Act.

In 1955, the number of persons convicted and fined was 2,616 and 2,347 were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders' Act.

EDUCATION AND SCHOOL ATTENDANCE ACTS.

A total of 3,928 persons were prosecuted in 1956 for offences under the Education and School Attendance Acts. The number convicted was 2,850 and a further 786 were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders' Act. 32 children were committed to approved schools.

In 1955 the number of persons prosecuted was 3,909, of which 2,787 were convicted and a further 790 were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders' Act. 25 children were committed to approved schools.

ROAD TRAFFIC ACT, 1933.

The number of persons prosecuted for offences against the Road Traffic Act in 1956 was 47,988, which is almost 51% of the total prosecuted for non-indictable offences and is 3,263 less than the number prosecuted under the Act in 1955. The number of females prosecuted in 1956 was 4,137, as compared with 4,841 in 1955.

The number of prosecutions for Drunkenness in year 1956 was 3,838 which was 37 more than the number in 1955. Prosecutions for Simple Drunkenness in 1956 numbered 2,019 as compared with 2,077 in 1955 and prosecutions for Drunkenness with Aggravations in 1956 numbered 1,819 as compared with 1,724 in 1955.

For offences by licensed persons or their servants, there were 1,969 prosecutions in 1956, as compared with 2,016 in 1955, the number of prosecutions for Offences against Closing Regulations alone was 1,874 in 1956, as compared with 1,918 in 1955.

ILLICIT DISTILLATION.

Sixty-five persons were prosecuted in 1956 for offences relating to Illicit Distillation, 48 were convicted and fined and a further five were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders' Act.

VAGRANCY LAWS.

522 persons were prosecuted for offences against the Vagrancy Laws in 1956, which is 23 less than the number prosecuted in 1955. 307 were convicted, of whom 261 were sent to prison without the option of a fine and 42 were fined. 149 were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders' Act.

For offences of "Begging" the number prosecuted in 1956 was 424, which is 22 more than the number in 1955. The number convicted was 262, of which 242 were sent to prison without the option of a fine. The number dealt with under the Probation of Offenders' Act was 123.

For offences of "Sleeping Out and not Having Visible Means of Subsistence", 17 persons were prosecuted in 1956, as compared with 42 in 1955. Four persons were convicted in 1956, three of whom were sent to prison without the option of a fine, six were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders' Act and the charges against the remaining seven were dismissed.

OTHER NON-INDICTABLE OFFENCES.

Offences for which no special headings are provided are grouped under heading "Other Offences" at the foot of Appendix C (1) and details are given in Appendix C (2).

The number of persons prosecuted for offences under this heading in 1956 was 145, of which 88 were charged with "Conduct Calculated to Provoke a Breach of the Peace" and 22 were charged with "Disorderly Behaviour".

In 1955, a total of 173 persons were charged with offences grouped under this heading, 118 of whom were charged with "Conduct Calculated to Provoke a Breach of the Peace" and seven were charged with "Disorderly Behaviour".

PART IV.

SCIENTIFIC AIDS TO CRIME DETECTION.

A special Section of Crime Branch Headquarters, known as The Technical Bureau, provides valuable assistance by means of scientific aids to Gardaí throughout the country in the investigation of crime.

The Section is provided with up-to-date equipment.

The staff is appointed from experienced members of the Force who have had technical training. Lectures, with practical demonstrations in modern methods of criminal investigation, are given to members of the Detective Branch, uniformed members in the more populous centres and recruits in training. Lectures are also given at the request of the Army Authorities, to parties of Military Police Probationers.

The Section is divided into six Sub-Sections, namely:—

The following is a brief resumé of the work performed by each Sub-Section during the year.

(1) INVESTIGATION.

The services of the members of this Unit are sought by Officers throughout the country in the investigation of serious crime. They act as a useful link between the Commissioner and local Officers at all stages of the investigations and co-relate enquiries extending over various Garda Districts.

The employment of extern experts, such as the State Pathologist, State Analyst, Handwriting and Textile experts, is arranged by this Unit.

The preliminary examination of handwriting exhibits, articles of clothing bearing stains, etc., by members of the Unit, resulted in the elimination of many of these and a consequent saving of expense which would arise through examination by extern experts.

During 1956, a total of 201 documents were examined and 124 eliminated. 128 articles of clothing, etc., bearing stains, were examined and 32 eliminated.

(2) FINGERPRINTS AND CRIMINAL RECORDS.

In this Sub-Section a complete record is kept of the convictions of each criminal, including a description, photograph, history of subject and the *modus operandi* employed.

The total criminal records now filed is 82,438, which includes 2,621 new registrations made in 1956.

Fingermarks found at the scenes of crimes are classified and compared with prints already recorded. This comparison sometimes leads to the identity of the criminal, but when no identification is made—as in the case of new entrants to crime—the prints found are preserved for future reference and it is often possible, when a new criminal has been arrested, to connect him with outstanding crimes.

Enquiries are daily received from, and sent to other Police Forces, and interchange of fingerprints and records is made in the case of travelling criminals.

Regular issues of *Fogra Tora* in two parts are prepared. Part I deals with persons wanted for crime, missing persons and descriptions of property stolen and recovered. Part II contains photographs of convicted persons, with their descriptions, which are filed at Garda Stations for reference. Photographs are supplied in convenient pocket-book form to detectives and Stations in cities.

(3) PHOTOGRAPHY.

This Sub-Section deals with the various phases of Police photography:—

(a) Photographs of criminals for circulation.

(b) Scenes of traffic accidents and crimes.

(c) Dead bodies at scenes of crimes and at morgues for identification.

(d) Documents: forgeries and suspect handwritings, restoring obliterated writing, examination with ultra-violet light for forgeries, etc.

(e) Photography of fingerprints and enlargements for Court purposes.

(f) Photostatic copies of Maps and other documents.

(g) Micro-photography of marks on bullets, tool marks on iron and woodwork for comparison purposes.

Members visited the scenes of 299 crimes or traffic accidents and attended 169 Courts during the year 1956.

Photographic work and examinations were undertaken for the Investigation Branch of the Department of Posts and Telegraphs, Post Office Stores, Irish Land Commission and the State Handwriting Expert.

An interesting and noteworthy development was recorded in connection with a Murder trial, *i.e.*, The People *v.* Cadden, in which a member prepared, and gave evidence of photographs of entries in the accused's diary. The original entries were made in red Biro which was super-imposed by blue-black ink writing. The member succeeded in suppressing the blue-black ink writing and showing the original entry. The suppression of the red Biro is a comparatively easy matter, but this was the first occasion on which the blue-black writing was suppressed to show up the red.

(4) MAPPING.

The scenes of 182 crimes or traffic accidents were visited by members of the Mapping Staff, 899 maps prepared and 174 Courts attended in 1956.

Maps and charts for official use by various branches of the Force were also prepared.

(5) BALLISTICS.

The duties of the members of this Sub-Section include the examination and comparison of guns, bullets, cartridge cases, glass fragments found at the scenes of road accidents or on the clothing of suspects, cutting instruments and marks on woodwork, etc., at scenes of crimes, restoring of erased numbers on motor vehicle engines and chassis and on pedal cycles.

A total of 4,641 exhibits were examined in 1956, made up of:—

(a) Firearms	76
(b) Bullets and Cartridge cases	2,351
(c) Cycles	11
(d) Miscellaneous	2,203

Included at (d) are glass fragments from traffic "Hit and Run" accidents, safes, housebreaking implements, footprints, clothing, pieces of metal and wood, tyres, etc.

The members visited the scenes of 26 crimes or traffic accidents, and attended 52 Courts in 1956.

(6) RADIO.

A central transmission and receiving station working on V.H.F. is established at Headquarters and operated by remote control from Dublin Castle, where the maintenance staff is attached.

The range covers some 30 miles, depending on contours of country.

In Dublin, Rathfarnham and Howth, there are 19 cars fitted with two-way radio telephone; 7 two-way sets and 12 receiving sets are also installed in Garda Stations in Dublin and adjoining counties.

Walkie-talkie radio sets are also issued to foot patrols for the control of crowds at public meetings, sports fixtures, etc.

Radio equipped cars are continuously patrolling in Dublin City and suburbs, and during variable hours in adjoining counties, and form a link with foot and cycle patrols. These cars are in constant touch with Headquarters and with one another.

Details of crimes, road accidents and street disturbances are broadcast and cars are directed to scenes to cut off the escape of fleeing criminals. These messages are also received at Garda Stations on the perimeter of the city, and patrols from these Stations are notified when necessary.

Radio communications are linked up to relay complaints received from the public over the "999" telephone system regarding crime, suspicious loiterers, etc., thus enabling speedy attention to be given to complaints, by the Gardaí. Several arrests on the spot have been made within a few minutes of the receipt of complaints, and vehicles which have been involved in hit and run accidents have also been intercepted.

A number of business houses in Dublin have installed automatic "burglar-alarms", which are connected to Detective Branch, Dublin Castle. Alarms received are broadcast at once to radio cars.

During the year 1956, there were 13,619 "999" calls received, resulting in the arrest of 628 offenders.

Patrols in the Dublin area were responsible for making 1,236 offenders amenable in the following cases:

326 Housebreakings and/or Larcenies,

30 Theft of motor vehicles,

334 cases of Street Disorders—Assaults, etc., and

546 other Offences.

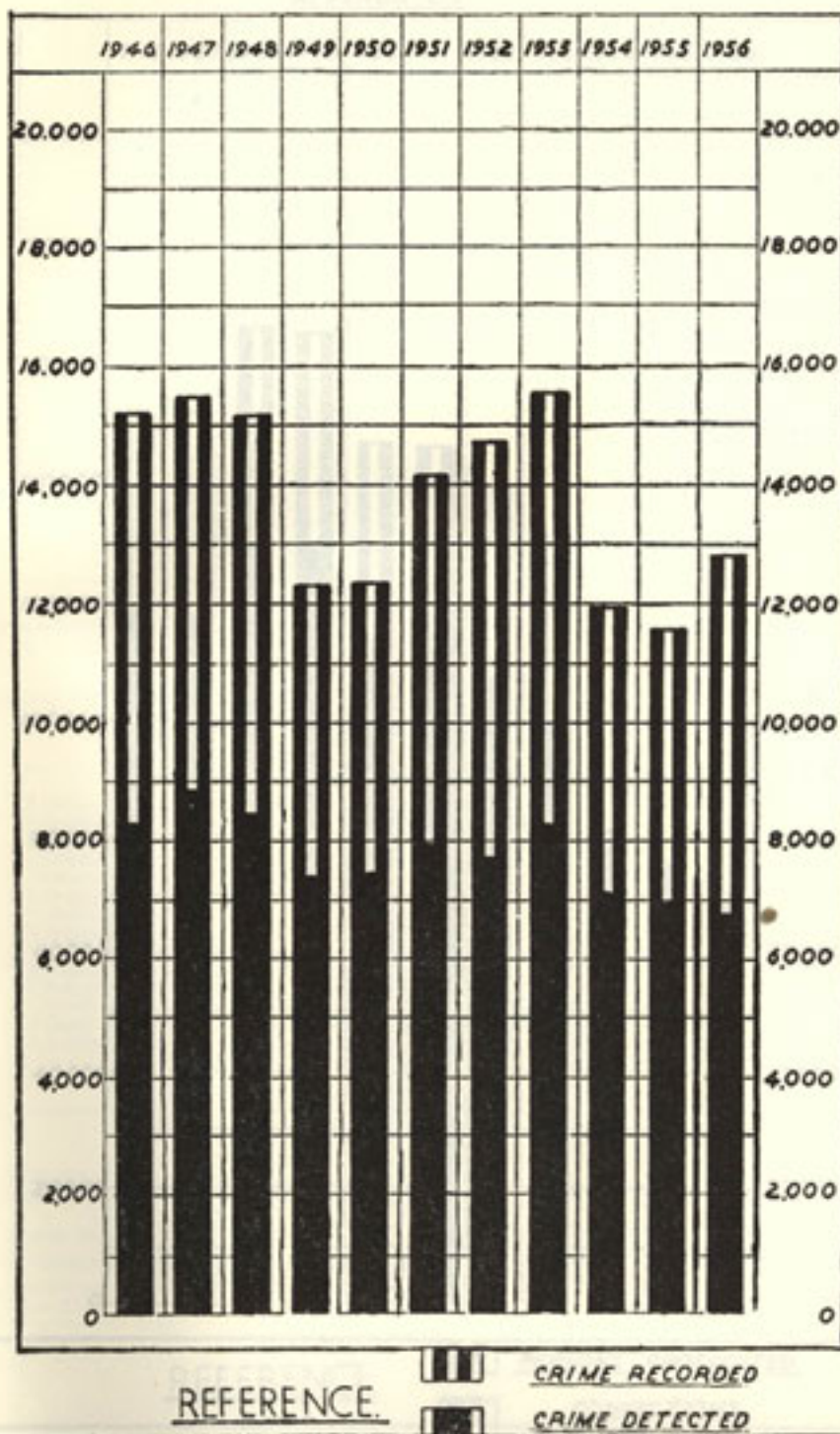

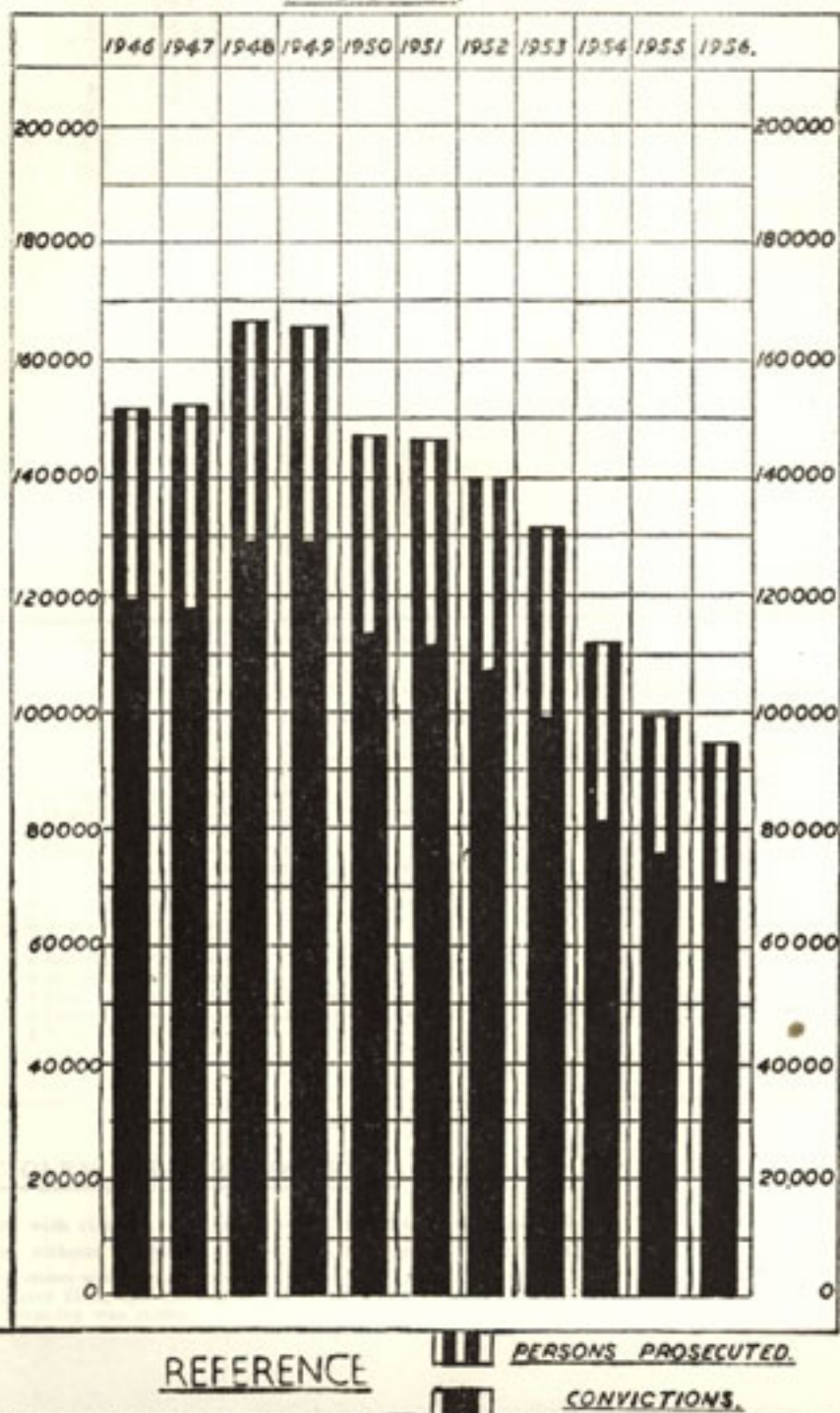
