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## ANNUAL REPORT.

To THE MINISTER FOR JUSTICE.

Sir,

I beg to submit herewith my Annual Report on Crime for the year ended 31st December, 1950.

### PART I.

#### INDICTABLE OFFENCES.

A total of 12,231 indictable offences were reported, or became known to the Garda Síochána during the year, 1950, which is 60 more than the total for the year 1949. Proceedings were taken in 6,995 cases.

The number of persons charged with indictable offences in the year, 1950, was 6,889. The number convicted was 2,796 and the charges against a further 2,862 were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied.

For details of indictable offences and proceedings see Appendix "A".

Comparative figures of indictable offences, proceedings, and persons proceeded against, in the years 1945 to 1950 are given in the following table:—

#### GROUP I—OFFENCES AGAINST THE PERSON.

Offences of Murder, Manslaughter, Wounding, Assault, Intimidation, Cruelty to and Abandoning of Children and Sexual Offences are included in this Group.

Comparative figures for offences recorded in this group and the number and percentage of cases in which proceedings were instituted in the years 1945 to 1950 are given in the following table:—

#### MURDER (OF PERSONS AGED ABOVE ONE YEAR).

Six murders of persons aged above one year were recorded in the year 1950. Proceedings were instituted in all cases. The accused in three cases were convicted.

Brief particulars are:—

##### Co. Roscommon.

On 23rd February, 1950, the dead bodies of two young children were found in a stream near their home. Their mother, who was in very delicate health admitted drowning the children, saying she did so as she feared for their welfare after her death. She was certified insane and was committed to a Mental Hospital.

##### Co. Offaly.

On 12th May, 1950, a young girl, employed as a typist by Bord na Mona, was shot dead when on her way to work. Her body was discovered in a clump of furze near the public road. An arrest was made and the accused was convicted and sentenced to death. An appeal was lodged and a re-trial was ordered. The accused was again convicted and sentenced to death. The death sentence was subsequently commuted to one of Penal Servitude for life.

##### Co. Offaly.

On 25th June, 1950, a young married woman died under suspicious circumstances, at her home. A Post Mortem examination was held and her death was found to have been caused by strychnine poisoning. Her husband was arrested and charged. On his trial the jury disagreed and he was put back in custody for re-trial. On his re-trial he was found "Not Guilty" and was discharged.

##### Co. Galway.

On 27th August, 1950, a young married woman was attacked by her husband, in their home, and was so severely beaten with a piece of an oar that she died on the following day. The husband was arrested and charged. On his trial he was found to be insane and unfit to plead, and it was ordered that he be detained during the pleasure of the Government.

##### Co. Clare.

On 23rd November, 1950, an elderly farmer and publican was severely beaten with a stick and stones during a violent quarrel and died in consequence. His son was arrested and charged. He was found guilty but insane and was ordered to be detained during the pleasure of the Government.

*Dublin Metropolitan Area.*

On 22nd December, 1950, an elderly spinster was attacked in her home by a young man who first attempted to choke her and then beat her to death with a poker. The culprit gave himself up to the Garda on the same date. He was convicted of the crime but was found to be insane, and was ordered to be detained during the pleasure of the Government.

**MURDERS (INFANTICIDE).**

Three murders of infants aged one year and under were recorded in the year 1950. Proceedings were instituted and the accused were convicted in two cases, both of which were dealt with under the Infanticide Act, 1949.

The case in which no proceedings were taken was recorded in Co. Waterford. The dead body of a female infant was found on the foreshore at Feirybank. The infant's skull was fractured in several places and a Post Mortem examination revealed that death was caused by violence.

**ATTEMPTS TO MURDER.**

No crime of Attempted Murder was recorded in the Year 1950. Two crimes were recorded in 1949.

**MANSLAUGHTER (OTHER THAN TRAFFIC FATALITIES).**

Five crimes of Manslaughter (other than Traffic Fatalities) were recorded in 1950. Brief Particulars are:—

*Co. Dublin.*

A young child who had entered a neighbour's house was strangled by a young domestic servant employed there. A charge of Murder was entered in this case. The accused was convicted of Manslaughter and was sentenced to 7 years' Penal Servitude.

*Dublin Metropolitan Area.*

A young man was shot dead with a .38 revolver at the rear of a city dance hall. A youth of 17½ years was convicted and received a suspensory sentence of 2 years' imprisonment.

*Dublin Metropolitan Area.*

A youth was fatally stabbed with a hiker's knife by another youth during an altercation concerning girls. A suspensory sentence of 3 years' Penal Servitude was imposed.

*Co. Tipperary.*

An elderly man was struck several blows and was fatally injured when knocked to the ground by his son during a domestic dispute which arose when both were returning home from a licensed premises. A sentence of 12 months' imprisonment was imposed.

*Co. Donegal.*

An elderly farmer received a severe blow on the head when he attempted to separate two men who were fighting. He died in consequence. One of the men was arrested and charged but he was acquitted.

Three crimes of Manslaughter (Traffic Fatalities) were recorded in the year 1950. Proceedings were instituted in each case. The accused in two cases were convicted and the third case is awaiting trial.

**WOUNDING, ETC. (FELONIES).**

Fourteen crimes of Wounding and other acts endangering life were recorded in 1950. Proceedings were instituted in 12 cases. Convictions were recorded in five cases and three cases are still pending.

Thirteen crimes were recorded in the year 1949.

**ASSAULT, WOUNDING, ETC. (MISDEMEANOURS).**

A total of 144 crimes was recorded in the year 1950. Proceedings were instituted in 137 cases. Convictions were recorded in 106 cases and in a further 19 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied. Four cases are still pending.

154 crimes were recorded in the year 1949.

**INTIMIDATION.**

Twenty-four crimes of Intimidation were recorded in 1950, which is double the number for the year 1949. Proceedings were instituted in 9 cases and convictions were recorded in 2 cases. One case is still pending.

**SEXUAL OFFENCES AGAINST FEMALES.**

A total of 187 offences against females was recorded in 1950. Comparative figures for offences and proceedings in the years 1945 to 1950 are given in the following table:—

**GROUP II—OFFENCES AGAINST PROPERTY WITH VIOLENCE.**  
Offences of Burglary, Housebreaking, Robbery and Malicious Injury to Property are included in this group.

The number of offences recorded in the group in the year 1950 was 2,445, an increase of 38 compared with the number in 1949.

Comparative figures of offences recorded and the number and percentage of offences in which proceedings were instituted in the years 1945 to 1950 are given in the following table:—

The number of offences relating to Housebreaking in 1950 was 2,031, a difference of 1 only compared with the number in 1949. In offences of Breaking into Dwellinghouses, the number of offences recorded in 1950 was 852 an increase of 18 compared with the number in 1949, while the number of offences of Breaking into Shops, Warehouses, etc. decreased by 30, from 1,070 in 1949 to 1,040 in 1950. Offences of Attempting to Break into Houses, Shops, etc. numbered 44 in 1950; an increase of 4, compared with the number in 1949. Twenty offences of Possession of House-breaking Tools were recorded in 1950 as compared with 15 in 1949.

**ROBBERY.**

32 offences of Robbery and Attempts to Rob were recorded in the year 1950 and firearms were alleged to have been used in the commission of six offences. Proceedings were instituted in 17 cases within the year and convictions were recorded in seven cases.

The six offences in which firearms were alleged to have been used were all committed in the Dublin Metropolitan Area. Four of these were attacks on city Post Offices, two of which were frustrated by the action of the assistants. Sums of £25 and £87 respectively were taken in the other two cases. In another case two youths, one of whom presented a revolver, entered and searched a Bookmaker's office but left without finding any money. In the remaining case two armed men entered a Corporation Rent Office, gagged and bound the Rent Collector and got away with the sum of £180.

**ARSON AND OTHER MALICIOUS INJURY TO PROPERTY.**

A total of 372 offences of Malicious Injury to Property was recorded for the year 1950, an increase of 28 compared with the number in 1949. Offences of Arson numbered 50 in the year 1950, a decrease of 13 compared with the number in 1949.

Proceedings were instituted in 213 cases in 1950 and resulted in 98 convictions. In a further 61 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied. 18 cases are still pending.

**GROUP III—OFFENCES AGAINST PROPERTY WITHOUT VIOLENCE.**

Included in this group are offences of Larceny, Embezzlement, Obtaining Goods, etc. by False Pretences, Frauds and Receiving Stolen Goods.

The number of offences recorded in this group in the year 1950 was 9,157 an increase of 27 compared with the number in the year 1949.

Comparative figures of offences and the number and percentage of cases in which proceedings were instituted in the years 1945 to 1950 are given in the following table:—

In comparison with the numbers of offences recorded in 1949 there was an increase of 26 in the number of larcenies and of 81 in Embezzlement, False Pretences and Frauds, and a decrease of 50 in offences of Receiving Stolen Property.

The number of larcenies recorded in the Dublin Metropolitan Area in the year 1950 was 5,804 or almost 69% of the total for the whole country. The number recorded in the year 1949 was 5,675, approximately 68% of the total for the whole country.

#### EMBEZZLEMENT.

110 offences were recorded for the year 1950, an increase of 25 compared with the number for 1949. In the Dublin Metropolitan Area, 94 offences were recorded for 1950 compared with 65 for 1949.

Proceedings were instituted in 107 cases in 1950. Convictions were recorded in 31 cases and in a further 41 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied.

#### OBTAINING GOODS, ETC. BY FALSE PRETENCES.

A total of 389 offences was recorded in the year 1950, an increase of 31 compared with the number in the year 1949. The number of offences recorded in the Dublin Metropolitan Area in 1950 was 126 compared with 88 in 1949.

Proceedings were instituted in 268 cases in 1950 and convictions numbered 172. In a further 61 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied. Ten cases are still pending.

#### FRAUDS.

41 offences relating to Frauds were recorded in 1950, an increase of 25 compared with the number in 1949. 24 offences were recorded in the Dublin Metropolitan Area in 1950.

Proceedings were instituted in 38 cases and convictions were recorded in 24 cases. In a further 3 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied.

#### RECEIVING STOLEN GOODS.

203 offences were recorded in 1950, a decrease of 80 compared with the number in 1949. Proceedings were instituted in 201 cases and convictions were recorded in 74 cases. In a further 54 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied. 9 cases are shown still pending.

#### GROUP IV—OTHER OFFENCE NOT INCLUDED IN THE FOREGOING GROUPS.

The offences included in this group are Forgery, Perjury, Bribery, Riot and Unlawful Assembly, Offences against Public Decency, Offences under Coinage Acts, Attempting to Commit Suicide, Offences under Treason Act, Breaches of the Offences against the State Act and Other Indictable Offences which are not included in Groups I, II or III.

A total of 130 offences was recorded in this group in the year 1950 a decrease of 8 as compared with the number in 1949. Proceedings were instituted in 92 cases. Convictions numbered 48 and in a further 21 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied. 6 cases are shown still pending.

60 offences of Forgery and Uttering were recorded for the year 1950, as compared with 58 for the year 1949. Proceedings were instituted in 34 cases in 1950 and convictions numbered 24. The charges in a further 2 cases were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied.

24 offences of Attempted Suicide were recorded for 1950 as compared with 19 for the year 1949.

Offences of Indecent Exposure (Public Indecency) numbered 6 in 1950 as compared with 15 in 1949.

#### ORGANISED VIOLENT CRIME.

28 Organised Crimes of Violence were recorded in the year 1950 as compared with 14 in the year 1949. Of the crimes recorded in 1950, 22 were Agrarian, 3 arose from a dispute concerning the appointment of a sub-postmaster, 2 arose from trade disputes and the remaining one from a dispute concerning the control of a dance hall.

### VALUE OF PROPERTY STOLEN AND RECOVERED.

Property valued at £107,742 0s. 8d. was reported as stolen during the year 1950, of which property valued at £36,414 1s. 7d. was recovered.

In offences against property with violence, i.e., Burglary, Housebreaking and Sacrilege, the value of property stolen was £34,983 16s. 1d. of which property valued at £10,960 5s. 1d. was recovered.

In offences against property without violence, i.e. Larcenies, the value of property reported as stolen was £72,758 4s. 7d., of which property valued at £25,453 16s. 6d. was recovered.

### SEX AND AGE OF PERSONS CONVICTED OF INDICTABLE OFFENCES.

Of the 6,889 persons charged with Indictable Offences in the year 1950 the number convicted was 2,796, or 41% of the total, of whom 2,542 were males and 254 females.

2,402 persons—2,182 males and 220 females—were convicted by Courts of Summary Jurisdiction and 394 persons—360 males and 34 females—were convicted by Circuit and Higher Courts.

### CHARGE PROVED AND PROBATION OF OFFENDERS ACT APPLIED.

In addition to the number of persons convicted, the number of persons against whom the charges were held proved and who were released under the Probation of Offenders Act for the year 1950 was 2,862 or 42% of the total persons charged. Of this total 2,474 were males and 388 females.

### INDICTABLE OFFENCES CLEARED UP IN 1950.

The number of indictable offences cleared up in the year 1950 was 7,483, details of which are contained in Columns 3 and 17 of Appendix A (1), in relation to offences reported in the year 1950, and in Column 2, Appendix G (2), in relation to offences reported in 1949 but not detected in that year.

The percentage of offences cleared up in 1950 in relation to the number reported was 61%. The percentage in the year 1949 was also 61%.

The incidence of Indictable Offences and detections is shown in graphical form in Appendix A (3).

PROCEEDINGS FOR INDICTABLE OFFENCES PENDING FROM YEAR, 1949—RESULTS.

In Appendix A (1) of my report for the year 1949, proceedings were shown pending in 302 cases. Two cases were since struck out of records and 44 cases are shown still pending. Of the 256 cases disposed of convictions were recorded in 75 cases and in a further 130 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied.

PROCEEDINGS IN 1950 FOR INDICTABLE OFFENCES RECORDED IN YEAR 1949.

During the year 1950, proceedings were instituted in respect of 53 indictable offences which were recorded in the year 1949, but were undetected at the end of that year. Convictions were recorded in 31 cases and in a further 6 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied.

The number of persons charged in connection with those offences was 33, of whom 21 were convicted and a further 7 were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders Act.

PART II.

JUVENILES CHARGED WITH INDICTABLE OFFENCES.

Details of Juvenile Offenders charged with indictable offences are given in Appendices "E" and "F".

The number of persons under 18 years who were charged with indictable offences and dealt with in the year 1950, was 2,453, an increase of 209 compared with the number dealt with in the year 1949. This increase is recorded in offences of Housebreaking, Larceny of Pedal Cycles, Larceny from Shops and Stalls and Malicious Injury to Property.

SEX AND AGE OF OFFENDERS.

The increase in the number of juveniles charged in 1950 is recorded principally in the upper and lower age groups with increases 107 and 87 respectively. There was a slight decrease in the number of females dealt with in each age group in the year 1950 compared with the numbers in 1949.

Lack of parental control is assigned to 38% of cases in the year 1950; Desire to get Money for Amusement, 26%; Mischief, 20%; Youthful Gang Influence, 12%; Criminal Associations, 3%; and Necessity, 1%.

PERCENTAGE OF JUVENILE OFFENDERS IN RELATION TO OTHER PERSONS CHARGED WITH INDICTABLE OFFENCES.

Juvenile offenders in the year 1950, formed almost 36% of the total persons charged with indictable offences. This high percentage may be explained by the fact that the percentage of juvenile offenders made amenable is far greater than the percentage of adult offenders made amenable.

#### JUVENILE OFFENDERS RELEASED UNDER THE PROBATION OF OFFENDERS ACT, 1907.

Of the 2,453 offenders dealt with in the year 1950, the number released under the Probation of Offenders Act was 1,841 or 75%.

The number of offenders charged for the first time was 1,892 of whom 1,454 were released under the Probation of Offenders Act.

The number charged for the second time was 408, of whom 360 were given the benefit of the Probation Act, 167, for the first time and 193 for the second time.

The number charged for the third time was 96 of whom 87 were given the benefit of the Probation Act, 24 for the first time, 40 for the second time and 23 for the third time.

The number charged for the fourth time or oftener was 57 of whom 5 were given the benefit of the Probation Act for the first time, 16 for the second time, 18 for the third time and 12 for the fourth time or oftener.

The number of persons prosecuted for non-indictable offences in the year 1950 was 147,582, compared with 165,046 in the year 1949.

The number of persons convicted was 112,541 or 76% of the persons prosecuted. The charges against an additional 26,725 or 18% were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied.

#### ASSAULTS.

1,100 persons were prosecuted for Assaults in the year 1950, of whom 811 were prosecuted for Common Assault, 187 for Assaults on Gardaí and 102 for Aggravated Assaults.

In the year 1949, 1,202 persons were prosecuted, 979 for Common Assault, 125 for Assaults on Gardaí and 98 for Aggravated Assaults.

663 persons were convicted in 1950 and the charges against 201 others were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied.

#### CRUELTY TO ANIMALS.

395 persons were prosecuted in the year 1950 for offences in relation to Cruelty to Animals of whom 303 were convicted and 51 others were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders Act.

In the year 1949, 514 persons were prosecuted, of whom 365 were convicted and a further 105 were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders Act.

#### DOGS—OFFENCES IN RELATION TO LICENSING OF.

A total of 11,700 persons were prosecuted in 1950 for keeping unlicensed dogs, a decrease of 1,494 compared with the number in the year 1949. The number of persons convicted of those offences in 1950 was 5,175 and fines were imposed in all cases. 5,051 persons were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders Act.

In the year 1949 the number of persons convicted was 5,329 and the charges against 5,980 others were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied.

#### EDUCATION AND SCHOOL ATTENDANCE ACTS.

The number of prosecutions for offences under the Education and School Attendance Acts in 1950 was the lowest in the past six years.

## INTOXICATING LIQUOR LAWS.

A total of 15,688 persons were prosecuted in 1950 for offences against the Intoxicating Liquor Laws, a decrease of 1,066 as compared with the number in the year 1949.

3,773 persons were prosecuted for Drunkenness in 1950—2,173 for Simple Drunkenness and 1,600 for Drunkenness with Aggravations. In the year 1949, 3,931 were prosecuted for Drunkenness—2,262 for Simple Drunkenness and 1,669 for Drunkenness with Aggravations.

The number of licensed persons prosecuted in the year 1950 for offences relating to the conduct of their premises was 2,032 of whom 1,896 were prosecuted for offences against the Closing Regulations. In the year 1949 the number prosecuted for those offences was 2,128 of whom 1,988 were prosecuted for offences against Closing Regulations.

31 persons were prosecuted in 1950 for Unlicensed Sale of Drink, compared with 22 persons prosecuted in 1949.

For other offences against the Intoxicating Liquor Laws, which includes offences of being found on licensed premises during prohibited hours, giving false names and addresses or refusing to give names and addresses when so found, refusing to quit licensed premises when lawfully required to do so, false representation as bona fide traveller, etc., the total number of persons prosecuted in 1950 was 9,852 compared with 10,673 in 1949.

## ILLICIT DISTILLATION.

### VAGRANCY LAWS.

695 persons were prosecuted in the year 1950 for offences against the Vagrancy Laws, compared with 720 in the year 1949. 405 persons were convicted and the charges against 188 others were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied.

For offences of "Begging" 477 persons were prosecuted in 1950, 298 were convicted and an additional 135 were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders Act. 486 persons were prosecuted in 1949 for such offences.

For offences of "Sleeping out, and not having a visible means of subsistence" 70 persons were prosecuted in the year 1950, compared with 121 in the year 1949. 36 persons were convicted in 1950 and 23 others were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders Act.

### OTHER OFFENCES.

Included under the heading "Other Offences" at the end of Appendix C (1) are Miscellaneous Offences for which no specific headings are provided and these offences are enumerated in Appendix C (2).

353 persons were prosecuted for these offences in the year 1950, compared with 715 in the year 1949. 207 were convicted and the charges against 88 others were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders Act.

For offences against the Milk Retail Prices Order, seven persons were prosecuted in the year 1950 compared with 252 persons prosecuted in the year 1949.

82 persons were prosecuted in 1950 for offences against the Supplies and Services (Temporary Provisions) Act, 1946 and Orders thereunder. The number prosecuted in the year 1949 was 200. Details of prosecutions for these offences are given in Appendix C (3) which includes only those offences which were detected by members of the *Gárda* or which were investigated by them on the complaint or at the direction of the Department of Industry and Commerce.

## PART IV.

### SCIENTIFIC AIDS TO CRIME DETECTION.

A special Section, known as the Technical Bureau, is established at Crime Branch Headquarters which provides valuable assistance to *Gárdaí* throughout the country in the investigation of crime by means of scientific aids.

The Section is provided with modern equipment to keep pace with scientific developments.

The staff is appointed from experienced members who have had technical training, and lectures and practical demonstrations in modern methods of criminal investigation are provided for members of Detective Branch, and for uniformed members in the more thickly populated centres.

Courses are also given to recruits when in training who are taken over the type of work undertaken by the Bureau, and instructed in methods of search for and preservation of clues which might otherwise escape notice or be obliterated by careless handling.

Brief particulars of the work done by the units are :—

(1) INVESTIGATION.

The services of this unit are sought by and allocated to local Officers to assist in the investigation of serious crimes. The Headquarters unit thus forms a useful link between Headquarters and local Officers at all stages of the investigation, and co-relates enquiries extending over various Districts. When necessary the unit arranges for the employment of extern experts such as the State Pathologist, State Analyst, Handwriting and Textile Experts, etc.

During the year 1950, Officers spent 236 days in visiting the scenes of crimes including murders, suspected murder and serious cases of housebreaking.

Preliminary examination of clothing and other articles for stains, comparison of specimens of handwriting, etc., were made of 365 articles of which 152 were eliminated before being sent to extern experts, thus saving considerable expense.

(2) FINGERPRINTS AND CRIMINAL RECORDS.

These records provide a complete record of previous convictions of each criminal, a description, photograph and history of subject with modus operandi employed.

The total number of criminal records filed is now 67,773, representing an increase of 2,324 on 1949 figures.

Fingerprints found at scenes of crimes are compared with records and when no identification is immediately made, as is the case of new entrants to crime, the prints are preserved for future reference and comparison. When a new criminal is arrested it is thus frequently possible to connect him with outstanding crimes.

Enquiries are daily received from and sent to other police forces and inter-change of fingerprints and records is made in the cases of travelling criminals.

Regular issues of Fogra Fora in two parts are prepared in this Section. Part I deals with persons wanted for crime, missing persons, and description of property stolen or property recovered for which owners are sought.

Part II contains photographs of convicted criminals, re-convictions, with their descriptions, which are filed at all stations for future reference.

Photographs, etc. of convicted criminals are also supplied in convenient pocket-book form to Detectives and Stations in cities.

(3) PHOTOGRAPHIC SECTION.

This section deals with many phases of police photography including :—

- (a) Photos of criminals and suspects for circulation.
- (b) Scenes of crimes and road traffic accidents.
- (c) Dead bodies at scenes, morgues, etc.
- (d) Documents, forgeries and suspect handwriting; restoring obliterated writings; examination with ultra-violet light for forgeries.
- (e) Photography of fingerprints and enlargements for Court purposes.
- (f) Photostatic copies of maps and other documents.
- (g) Micro-photography of marks on bullets, tool-marks on iron, wood-work, etc. for comparison.

During the year members spent 242 days attending Courts, 192 days at scenes of crimes.

Work was performed also for Departments of External Affairs, Posts and Telegraphs, Oireachtas, National Museum and Statistics Office.

#### (4) MAPPING SECTION.

This section supplies maps for all police purposes including those of scenes of crimes, road-traffic accidents, special traffic charts, and maps and charts for Department of Justice.

During the year the scenes of 181 crimes or road traffic accidents were visited, 935 maps prepared, and 187 days spent in Courts.

The Courts have come to rely on the production of maps made by qualified Gardaí as a valuable part of evidence.

#### (5) BALLISTIC SECTION.

The duties performed by this section include examination of guns, bullets, cartridge cases and explosives; restoring erased numbers on stolen cycles and motor vehicles, batteries, etc.; examination of glass fragments found at road traffic accident scenes, or in clothing of suspects; examination and comparison of cutting instruments used in forcing doors, windows, safes, etc.

Exhibits were examined in 15 cases where firearms were used during the year, the most important being in the case of murder of Rose Hand (Offaly). In this case it was possible to determine, within narrow limits, the range at which shot was discharged and also the line of fire. These two findings had an important bearing on the case for the prosecution.

During the year a total of 445 exhibits were received for examination, including 34 firearms, 195 rounds of ammunition, 23 cycles and 193 other articles.

The members attended Courts on 31 days during the year.

#### (6) WIRELESS SUB-SECTION.

A central transmission and receiving station is established at Garda Headquarters which is operated by remote control from Dublin Castle.

The maintenance and operating staff is now attached to Dublin Metropolitan Division where 14 patrol cars, fitted with wireless, operate.

Receiving sets are also installed in 14 Garda Stations and 8 two-way sets in Dublin and surrounding counties.

Arrangements are being made for further provision of wireless for patrol cars in Dublin and Wicklow counties.

Wireless cars in operation in Dublin are continuously circulating in city and suburbs and form a link with foot and cycle patrols.

These cars are in constant touch with Headquarters and with one another.

Particulars of serious crimes, traffic accidents and street disturbances are broadcast and cars are directed to scenes or to cut off escape routes of fleeing criminals. These messages are also received at Garda Stations on main routes leading from Dublin and patrols from these Stations are notified where necessary.

Wireless communications are also linked up to relay complaints received from public over "999" telephone system regarding crime, suspicious loiterers, etc., thus enabling speedy attention to be given by Garda to complaints. Action by Garda has resulted in several arrests on the spot within a few minutes of receipt of complaints and in the interception of vehicles involved in "hit and run" accidents.

During the year 1950, some 3,300 calls over "999" system were received, of which 226 were broadcast to radio cars, which resulted in arrests for 111 cases of indictable and other crimes of which the following are examples:—

Arrests were made also in following cases:—

Three portable wireless sets (known as "walkie-talkie") were provided during the year on experimental basis for foot patrols. They are used with advantage in regulating traffic in congested conditions and in controlling large crowds at sporting fixtures and public meetings.

### GENERAL.

Due to structural defects, discovered in the building at Royal Hospital, Kilmainham, Garda Headquarters was transferred during the year to the Depot, Phoenix Park (Phone 71156).

"A" Branch (Finance, Traffic, etc.) and Technical Bureau remain at St. John's Road, Kingsbridge (Phone 76363) due to lack of accommodation at Phoenix Park.

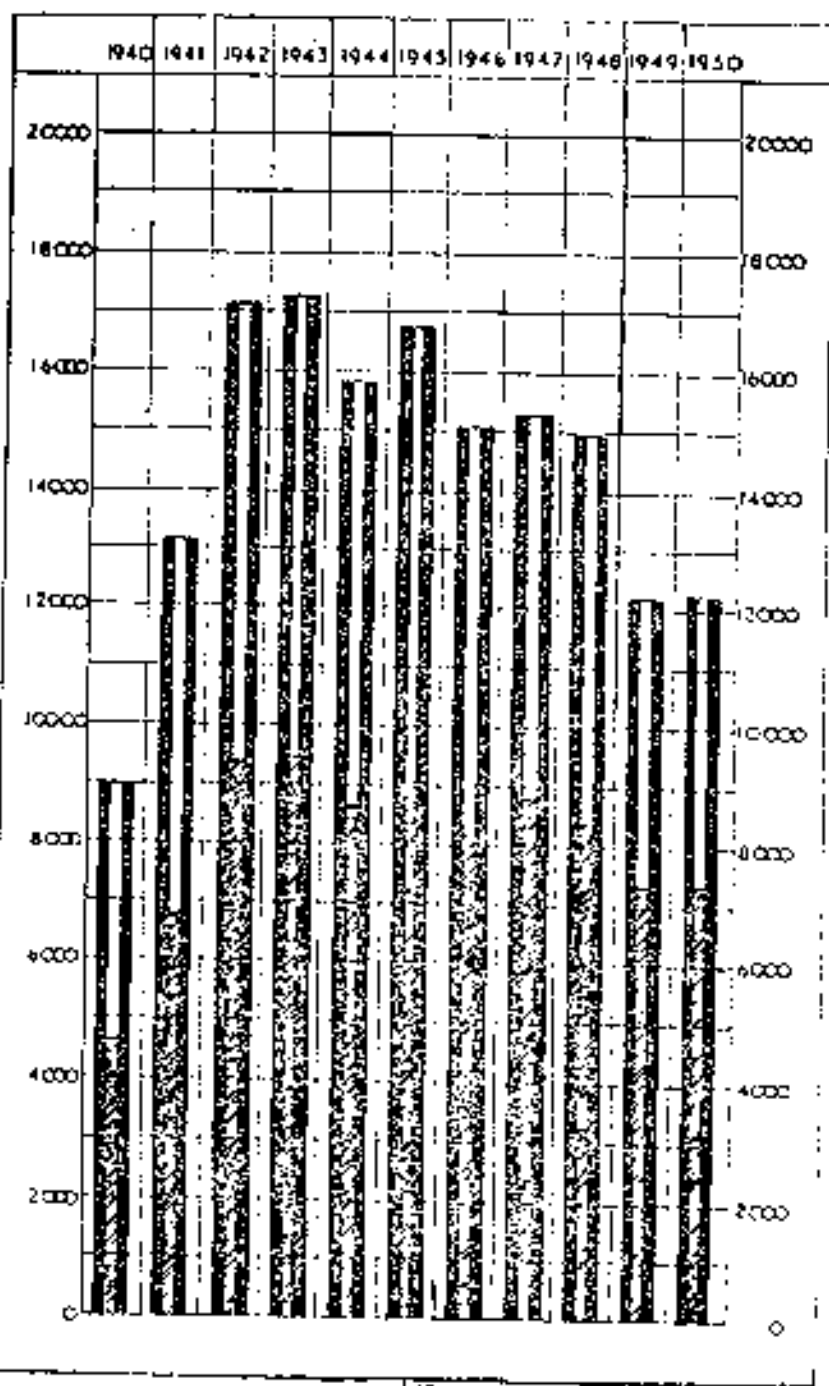

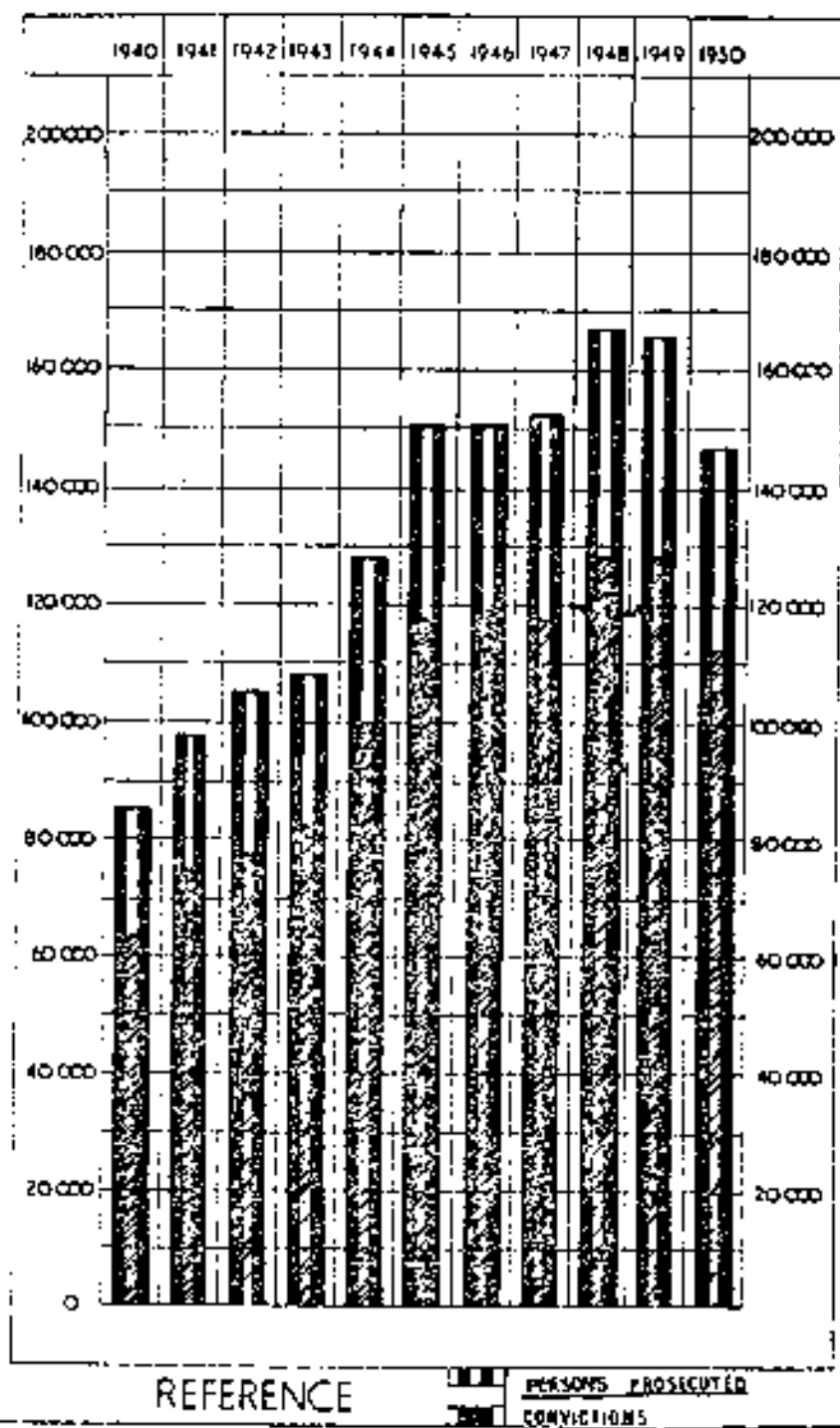
