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ANNUAL REPORT.

To the Minister for Justice.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit my Annual Report on Crime for the year ended 30th September, 1958.

Since my last report the forms for the preparation of Crime Returns have been revised and the dates, for which the returns are made, altered from the calendar year to year ending 30th September. Consequently, offences and proceedings in the last quarter of 1957 are included in this report.

PART I.

INDICTABLE OFFENCES .

The number of indictable offences which were reported or became known to the Garda in the year ended 30th September, 1958, was 16,567, which is 2,530 more than in 1957. The increase was mainly in Larceny and Housebreaking.

Proceedings were commenced in 7,749 cases and in an additional 717 cases the perpetrators were detected, giving a total of 8,466 detections, 51% of the offences recorded.

Comparison with Previous Year.

The number of offences recorded in each offence group and the number and percentage of detections in 1957 and 1958 are given in the following table.

Indictable Offences and Detections by Garda Divisions.

Details of Indictable Offences and detections, in each Garda Division and in the Garda Districts of the cities of Cork, Limerick, Waterford and Galway, in 1958, are given in Appendix C.

GROUP I - Offences Against the Person.

Included in this group are offences of Murder, Manslaughter, Wounding, Assault, Intimidation, Cruelty to and Abandoning Children and Sexual Offences.

Comparative figures of offences and detections in the group in years 1953 to 1958 are given in the following table :-

MURDER - Of Persons aged above One Year.

Four murders of persons aged above one year were recorded during the year and proceedings were taken in two cases. In a further case the perpetrator was committed to a mental hospital.

Brief particulars are :-

Co. Wexford. On 8th March, 1958, at about 11 p.m. a 61 year old shopkeeper was found, seriously injured, in his shop. He was removed to hospital where he died at 9.20 a.m. on 9th March, 1958. He was found to have sustained fourteen wounds on his head. It is believed that robbery was the motive. No one has yet been made amenable for this crime.

Co. Galway. On 9th April, 1958, a 60 year old farmer was attacked and killed by his 28 year old son. Injuries inflicted on him included a fractured neck and ribs. The son was arrested and charged with murder. He was later certified insane and was committed to a Mental Hospital. At the Central Criminal Court on 21st May, 1958, he was found to be insane and unfit to plead and was ordered to be detained during the pleasure of the Government. The accused man had previously spent three terms in a Mental Hospital.

Co. Galway. On 16th June, 1958, a 65 year old housewife was killed by her husband who cut her throat with a razor. He then attempted to end his own life by cutting his throat. He was removed to hospital where he recovered from his wound but was certified to be insane and was committed to a mental hospital.

Co. Galway. On morning of 31st August, 1958, at 2 a.m. a 34 year old carpenter was found unconscious in a public street. He was removed to hospital where he was found to be suffering from two fractures of the skull and other severe injuries. He died on 1st September, 1958, without regaining consciousness. The deceased and others had been drinking in a public house and on leaving, a fight developed, during which he was knocked to the ground and kicked about the head. Three men were arrested and charged with murder. At the Central Criminal Court on 27th November, 1958, they were acquitted by a direction of the Judge.

In the year 1957, six murders of persons aged above one year were recorded.

MURDER - Of Infants aged one Year and Under.

Two crimes of Murder of Infants were recorded within the year.

Brief particulars are :-

Co. Kerry. On 29th October, 1957, the dead body of a male infant was found in the grounds of a hotel near a town. A nylon stocking was tied tightly round its neck. Death was due to asphyxia. No one was made amenable.

Co. Louth. On 31st August, 1958, the dead body of a female infant was found in a water-tub at the back door of a Council cottage. The body was fully clothed. Death was due to asphyxia caused by drowning. The mother of the infant, who is believed to have put it in the tub, was found to be a serious mental case and was committed to a mental hospital where she is still detained. The Attorney General has agreed that there shall not be a prosecution in this case.

In the year 1957, two murders of infants were also recorded. INFANTICIDE.

Four crimes of Infanticide were recorded within the year, which is the same number as recorded in 1957.

Brief particulars are :-

Co. Cork. - On 18th November, 1957, a 24 year old domestic servant gave birth to a remale infant in her home where its dead body was found. There were marks of violence on the infant's neck, death being due to asphyxia. She was arrested and charged with murder but was committed for trial for Infanticide and at the Circuit Court was found "Not Guilty" and discharged.

Co. Wexford. - On 6th December, 1957, a 20 year old domestic servant gave birth to a female infant in the home of her grand-parents and drowned it in a barrel of water. She was committed for trial for Infanticide. At the Circuit Court she pleaded guilty and was sentenced to six months' imprisonment, suspended on her entering into recognizances to keep the peace for twelve months.

Co. Donegal. - On 23rd May, 1958, information was received by the Garda that a 33 year old widow had, some time previously, given birth to an infant and had probably killed it. On being questioned in the matter she admitted that she gave birth to a male infant some time in the period, 17th March to 6th April, 1958, and said she wrapped the baby in a woollen cardigan and threw it into a river. The woollen cardigan, as described, was later found on the river bank but no trace was found of the body. She was arrested and charged with murder and was committed for trial to the Central Criminal Court for Infanticide. Owing to an irregularity in the order the Attorney-General directed that she be released from prison, re-arrested and again charged with Murder. This was done and at the District Court the Justice directed her immediate release, holding that his original order should first be quashed by a superior Court before he could proceed to any further action in the case.

Co. Galway. - On 11th March, 1958, a 29 year old domestic servant gave birth to a male infant in her home and killed it by tying a piece of cloth around its neck. She put the body in a flour sack and deposited it in a disused cabin near her home. She was arrested and charged with Murder. She pleaded guilty to Infanticide at the District Court and was sentenced to six months' imprisonment which was suspended on her entering into recognizances to be of good behaviour for two years.

ATTEMPT TO MURDER.

Three crimes were recorded within the year. Brief particulars are :-

Co. Meath. - On 6th October, 1957, a 50 year old housewife was attached in her home by a 39 year old labourer who stabbed her several times with a pen-knife. Her injuries were not serious. The assailant was arrested and while in custody was certified insane and transferred to a Mental Hospital. The charge was re-entered on 5th March. 1958, and he was committed for trial. At the Central Criminal Court on 21st July, 1958, he was found to be insane and incapable of pleading and was ordered to be detained in strict custody during the pleasure of the Government.

Co. Meath. - On 6th October, 1957, a 23 year old girl was followed a short distance along the public road near her home by the accused in the foregoing case, who stabbed her several times with a pen-knife. She was mistaken for a daughter of the other injured party, whose family, accused stated were getting into his blood and brain. The proceedings concluded as stated.

Co. Galway. - During the month of September, 1958, a 29 year old farmer's son attempted to kill his 31 year old brother by putting "Kilcrow" in milk and on bread which he believed his brother was about to consume. The consequent discolouration of the items was noticed and they were not used. He also put "Kilcrow" in a chocolate sweet and strychnine on a cocoa-nut biscuit which he handed to his brother on separate occasions but in each case they were spat out as soon as tasted and no harm resulted. A charge of Attempted Murder was entered and the accused was sent for trial. At the Central Criminal Court he was found to be insane and unfit to plead and was ordered to be detained in strict custody during the pleasure of the Government.

Three crimes of Attempted Murder were recorded in 1957 also.

THREATS ETC. TO MURDER.

Two crimes of Threatening to Murder were recorded in 1958. Brief particulars are:-

Co.Kerry. On 10th March, 1958, an auctioneer, who had arranged to conduct a Sherriff's Sale on 19th March, found a slip of note-paper in the letter-box at his office on which was written words threatening death if he carried out the sale. The sale was cancelled and arrangements made to hold it elsewhere. No one has been made amenable.

Co. Tipperary. - On 16th August, 1958, a letter was received by an ex-British Army Officer threatening to kill his wife. It was written and posted on 11th August, by a 42 year old chemist, but owing to the offensive nature of the address on the original envelope, was delayed by Postal Authorities who supplied an official covering. The lady whose life was threatened was seriously assaulted by the writer of the letter on 12th August. He was arrested and charged. At the District Court a sentence of two months imprisonment with hard labour was imposed but was suspended on his entering into recognizances to keep the peace and be of good behaviour for one year.

Three crimes of Threatening to Murder were recorded in 1957.

MANSLAUGHTER (OTHER THAN TRAFFIC FATALITIES).

Two crimes of Manslaughter (other than Traffic Fatalities) were recorded within the year.

Brief particulars are:-

Co.Donegal. On 3rd November, 1957, arising out of an altercation in a public house, a 60 year old farmer was felled to the floor. He sustained severe fracture of the skull and died on 7th November. His assailant was arrested and charged. At the District Court informations were refused and he was discharged.

Co. Kildare. - On 24th December, 1957, a 28 year old labourer was fatally shot with a .22 rifle by a 45 year old contractor. The deceased and another man called at the Contractor's home at 12.30 a.m. seeking the loan of a cycle pump and when told one was not available they asked for tea or food and refused to go away when requested. The contractor took his rifle and opened the door whereupon the deceased grabbed the rifle and in the ensuing struggle for possession of the weapon a shot was discharged with fatal results. The contractor was arrested and charged with Manslaughter. At the District Court informations were refused and he was discharged.

Two crimes of Manslaughter (other than Traffic Fatalities) were recorded in 1957 also.

MANSLAUGHTER (TRAFFIC FATALITIES).

The number of cases of Manslaughter arising from Traffic Fatalities in 1958 was 42 as compared with 24 in 1957.

Proceedings were commenced in 39 cases and in one case a conviction was recorded. Seven cases are shown awaiting trial.

WOUNDINGS, ASSAULTS, etc.

267 offences of Wounding, Assault, etc. were recorded during the year as compared with 223 in 1957. Proceedings were commenced in 259 cases. Convictions were recorded in 194 cases and in a further 38 the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied. Eleven cases are shown pending.

INTIMIDATION.

25 offences of Intimidation were recorded during the year 23 of which were by Threatening Letters, etc. Proceedings were commenced in 7 cases and resulted in one conviction. Two cases are pending.

SEXUAL OFFENCES AGAINST FEMALES.

Sexual offences against females totalled 146 for the year which is 16 more than in 1957.

GROUP II - OFFENCES AGAINST PROPERTY WITH VIOLENCE.

Included in this group are offences of Burglary, Housebreaking, Robbery and Malicious Injury to Property.

There was an increase of 584 in the number of offences recorded in the group within the year as compared compared with the number in 1957 which was recorded in offences relating to Housebreaking.

Comparative figures of offences and proceedings in years 1953 to 1958 are given in the following table.

HOUSEBREAKING.

A total of 3,459 offences relating to Housebreaking was recorded for the year, which is 564 more than in 1957. Of the total, offences of Breaking into Shops, Warehouses, etc., numbered 1,902 as compared with 1,625 in 1957. Housebreaking (Dwellinghouses) numbered 1,162 as compared with 859 in 1957, and Burglary numbered 251 as compared with 213 in 1957.

Comparative figures for total offences relating to Housebreaking and proceedings in the years 1953 to 1958 are given in the following table.

ROBBERY.

Sixty-one offences of Robbery and Assaults with Intent to Rob were recorded within the year. Firearms were alleged to have been used in two cases, brief particulars of which are:-

DUBLIN METROPOLITAN DIVISION - On 17th May, 1958, between 5 and 6 p.m. two men entered a bookmaker's premises and closed the door. One of them produced what appeared to be a revolver, pointed it at the three assistants - all girls - and told his companion to search for money. They got away with £101 in cash. Two young men were arrested and charged with the crime. At the Circuit Court they pleaded guilty and were each sentenced the 12 months imprisonment with hard labour.

Co. Cork. - On 30th May, 1958, two men entered a Bank premises, one of them handed in a note which read "It is time you helped the I.R.A. Pass the money over I have orders to kill". The Manager and Teller came to grips with the raiders who fled after firing three shots and escaped in a motor car. Two men - brothers - were arrested and charged. At the Circuit Court they pleaded guilty. One was sentenced to 3 years Penal Servitude and the other to 18 months imprisonment with hard labour. Both had previous criminal records.

Of the remaining cases the more serious were :-

Dublin Metropolitan Division. — On 20th December, 1957, at 2 a.m. a Radio Taxi was engaged by two men and, when some distance outside the City, one of them seized the driver from behind and compelled him to stop the car. He was then ordered out of the car which was driven away by the men and was later found on fire in the City area. It was completely destroyed. Two men were arrested and charged. At the Circuit Court both were convicted and sentenced to 12 months imprisonment which was suspended on their entering into recognizances to be of good behaviour for two years. Motive was trade jealousy.

Dublin Metropolitan Division. - On 18th April, 1958, between 10 and 11 a.m. two men gained admission to a residence by knocking on the door. They pushed the housewife before them upstairs where they searched the bedrooms and took away between £700 and £900 in notes. No one has been made amenable.

Dublin Metropolitan Division. - On 21st June, 1958, at 6 p.m. two youths forced their way into a Post Office as the Postmistress was closing the door. After ordering her not to stir or they would shoot one of them knocked her to the floor and held her while the other searched for money. They got away with more than £78. Both offenders were arrested and were sentenced to 2 years and 18 months imprisonment respectively.

Dublin Metropolitan Division. - On 11th July, 1958, at 2.5 p.m. two youths entered a Post Office. They rushed behind the counter, knocked down the Postmistress and gagged her with a nylon stocking and twine. One of them went to the safe and took away £160.5.0. The offenders in the foregoing case were also responsible for this crime and were dealt with as stated.

Proceedings were commenced in 43 cases and convictions were recorded in 36 cases. In a further two cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied. Three cases are awaiting trial.

In the year 1957, 33 offences of Robbery, etc. were recorded, in one of which firearms were used.

ARSON AND OTHER MALICIOUS INJURIES TO PROPERTY.

A total of 118 offences of Arson, etc., was recorded within the year, of which 55 were offences of Arson, 5, Killing or Maiming of Cattle and 8 Malicious Use etc. of Explosives.

Proceedings were commenced in 64 cases and convictions were recorded in 29 cases. In a further 15 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act was applied. Eight cases are shown pending.

In 1957 a total of 128 offences was recorded of which Arson numbered 61, Malicious Use etc. of Explosives, 11, and Killing or Maiming Cattle 8.

GROUP III - Offences against Property without Wiolence.

Included in this group are offences of Larceny, Embezzlement, Obtaining Goods, etc., by False Pretences, Frauds and Receiving Stolen Goods.

The total of offences recorded in the group for the year was 12,219 which is 1,890 more than the number for 1957. In larcenies alone there was an increase of 1,924. There was a decrease of 34 in offences of Obtaining Goods etc. by False Pretences.

Comparative figures of total offences in the group in years 1953 to 1958 are given in the following table:-

of the total larcenies recorded in 1958, the number recorded in the Dublin Metropolitan Area was 8,446 or 72% as compared with 6,851 or 70% in 1957, 5,652 or 64% in 1956 and 5,171 also 64% in 1955.

EMBEZZLEMENT.

Twenty-two offences of Embezzlement were recorded in 1958 as compared with 41 in 1957. Proceedings were commenced in 20 cases. Convictions were recorded in four cases and in a further twelve cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied.

OBTAINING GOODS, ETC., BY FALSE PRETENCES.

In offences of "False Pretences" there was a decrease of 34 in 1958 as compared with 1957, the totals being 201 and 235 respectively. Proceedings were commenced in 166 cases within the year. Convictions numbered 109 and in a further 24 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied.

FRAUDS.

40 offences relating to Frauds were recorded for the year, which is 11 less than the number for 1957. Proceedings were commenced in 38 cases. Convictions numbered 20 and in a further 13 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation Act applied.

GROUP IV. - OFFENCES NOT INCLUDED IN FOREGOING GROUPS.

Included in this group are offences of Forgery and Uttering, Perjury, Bribery, Riot and Unlawful Assembly, Offences against Public Decency, Offences under Coinage Acts, Attempting to commit Suicide, Offences under the Treason Act and Offences against the State Act and other Indictable Offences not included in Groups I, II or III.

A total of 145 offences was recorded in the group in 1958 which is 19 less than in 1957. Proceedings were commenced in 113 cases in 1958. Convictions numbered 59 and in a further 35 cases the charges were held proved and the Probation Act applied.

Offences of Forgery and Uttering accounted for 101 of the total offences in the group, which is 4 less than the number for 1957. Proceedings were commenced in 85 cases. Convictions were recorded in 40 cases and in a further 30 the charges were held proved and the Probation Act applied.

Fourteen cases of Attempting to Commit Suicide were recorded for the year, two less than the number in 1957.

ORGANISED CRIMES OF VIOLENCE.

Ten organised crimes of violence were recorded for 1958 of which eight were agrarian and the remaining two political. Of the agrarian crimes, five were committed in one area of Co.Kerry; in two of them explosives were used and in a further two shots were fired into dwellings. The remaining case concerned the sending of a notice threatening death which is referred to earlier in this report. The remaining crimes were committed in Co.Leitrim, where a motor car was seriously damaged by explosives and hay valued £400 was maliciously burned,

and in Co. Donegal, where a tractor, a quantity of straw and a cow-shed were maliciously damaged by fire.

The two political crimes concerned the unlawful possession of explosives.

In the year 1957, twenty organised crimes of violence were recorded, 12 of which were agrarian, six political and two sectarian.

VALUE OF PROPERTY STOLEN AND RECOVERED.

The total value of property reported as stolen in 1958 was £187,784, of which property valued £53,575 was recovered.

In offences against property with violence i.e. Burglary, Housebreaking and Sacrilege, the value of property reported as stolen was £71,488, of which property valued £20.353, was recovered.

In offences against property without violence i.e. Isrcenies, the value of property reported as stolen was \$116,296 of which property valued £33,222 was recovered.

In comparison with the figures for 1957, there was an overall increase of £31,624 in the value of property reported stolen; £9,333 in offences against property with violence and £22,291 in offences against property without violence.

INDICTABLE OFFENCES CLEARED UP IN 1958.

The number of indictable offences cleared up in 1958 was 8,466, details of which are given in Columns 3(a) and 17 of Appendices A (1), (2) & (3). The percentage of offences cleared up in 1958 in relation to the number recorded was 51% as compared with 54% in 1957.

The incidence of indictable offences and detections in years 1948 to 1958 is shown in Graphical form in Appendix B.

PART II

NON-INDICTABLE OFFENCES - PERSONS PROSECUTED.

The number of persons prosecuted for non-indictable offences in 1958 was 82,876, which is 4,209 less than the number in 1957.

The number of persons found guilty was 76,600 or 92% of the number prosecuted, 62,647 of whom were convicted and 13,953 against whom the charges were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied.

ASSAULTS.

A total of 1,233 persons were prosecuted for Assaults in 1958. 817 were convicted and the charges against a further 186 were held proved and the Probation of Offenders Act applied, giving a total of 1,003 persons "found guilty".

In 1957 the number of persons prosecuted was 1,179, of whom 989 were found guilty - 748 by conviction, and 241 dealt with under the Probation Act.

DOGS - OFFENCES IN RELATION TO LICENSING OF.

There was a decrease of 966 in the number of persons prosecuted for keeping unlicensed dogs, the total for 1958 being 4,200 as compared with 5,166 in 1957. 3,900 persons were found guilty, of whom 2,449 were convicted. The remaining 1,451 were dealt with under the Probation Act. In 1957 the number of persons found guilty was 4,890, of whom 2,721 were convicted and 2,169 dealt with under the Probation Act.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE ACT, 1926.

A total of 3,307 persons were prosecuted in 1958 for offences against the School Attendance Act as compared with 3,153 in 1957. The number convicted was 2,285 and the charges against a further 720 were held proved and the Probation Act applied.

HIGHWAY ACTS.

The number of persons prosecuted in 1958 for offences against the Highway Ac's - including Road Traffic Act 1933 and Regulations thereunder and Road Transport Acts - was 49,703, which is 2,494 more than the number prosecured in 1957.

MALICIOUS DAMAGE TO PROPERTY.

The number of persons prosecuted in 1958 for offences of Malicious Damage to Property was 1,019. The number convicted was 665 and the charges against a further 188 were held proved and the Probation Act applied.

In 1957, 1:165 persons were prosecuted, 675 were convicted and a further 334 were dealt with under the Probation Act.

REVENUE LAWS.

665 persons were prosecuted in 1958 for offences against the Revenue Laws. 460 were convicted and a further 161 were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders Act.

The number prosecuted in 1957 was 2,326, of whom, 1,638 were convicted and a further 483 dealt with under the Probation Act.

VAGRANCY LAWS.

A total of 580 persons were prosecuted in 1958 for offences against Vagrancy Laws. 383 were convicted and a further 134 were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders Act.

In 1957 the number of persons prosecuted was 587 of whom 358 were convicted and 171 were dealt with under the Probation Act.

For offences of "Begging" alone, the number of persons prosecuted in 1958 was 399 of whom 290 were convicted and 75 were dealt with under the Probation of Offenders Act. In 1957 the number prosecuted was 432, of whom 277 were convicted and the charges against a further 114 were dealt with under the Probation Act.

PART III

SCIENTIFIC AIDS TO CRIME DETECTION.

The Technical Bureau, staffed by experienced members the have had technical training, affords scientific aid to Gardaí throughout the country, and gives instructions and practical demonstrations in modern methods of criminal investigation to other members of the Force, particularly to recruits in training.

The Bureau is divided into six sub-sections, viz:-

(1) Investigation (2) Fingerprints and riminal Records

(4) Mapping. (5) Ballistics. (6) Radio.

(3) Photography.

The following work was carried out by the specialised sub-sections during the year.

- (1) Fingerprints and Criminal Records (Known as D.C.R.Office).

The figures at number 6 above (cases in which articles were received for fingerprint examination) show an increase of 178 or 21% on the figures for the previous year, with a corresponding increase in the number of identifications made therefrom. Compared with the figures for 1955, it shows an increase of 135%

The nominal index of persons registered in the D.C.R. office (about 120,000) was found to be unsatisfactory in its application owing to the different phonetic spelling which could be given to some surnames. A new filing system has been devised in which names sounding alike but spelled differently are now grouped together.

PHOTOGRAPHY.

Official photographs for court presentation and general purposes were as follows:-

1. Total number of photographs prepared 10,924
2. Total number of photostatic copies 689
showing an increase of 4,213 copies in the photographic output over the previous year.

Specialist photographic work was also carried out for other State Departments including Department of Justice, Department of Posts and Telegraphs, Revenue Commissioners and the Central Bank.

Members visited the scenes of 562 crimes; attended 93 courts; 4 inquests and 2 conferences.

(3) MAPPING.

The scenes of 203 crimes were visited by members of the Mapping sub-section during the year - 157 courts were attended and 983 maps prepared. The figures pertaining to outdoor duty shows an increase of 25% over the corresponding figures for the year 1957.

(4) BALLISTICS.

In addition to the examination and comparison of firearms this sub-section undertakes the examination of exhibits such as glass fragments, cutting instruments, marks on wood, footprints, tyremarks, etc. They also deal with the restoration of defaced numerals on motor vehicles and pedal cycles. During the year under review the members visited 30 scenes of crimes, 29 courts, 7 conferences, 3 inquests and examined 49 firearms (exhibits), 756 bullets and cartridge cases, 5 cycles and repaired 137 official firearms.

INTERESTING CASES.

In a housebreaking case a minute fragment of glass found in one of the soles of a suspect's boot was positively identified by a misroscopic examination with glass from a window of the damaged premises.

In a case of unlawful possession a hallmark and serial number which had been obliterated on a piece of gold were restored by means of a chemical reagent.

In a housebreaking case - dust from a cash box was found to contain a minute piece of steel which was located by means of a magnet. This minute piece was positively identified miscroscopically as having come from the cutting edge of a wood chisel which was in the possession of a suspect and which had been used to force the cash box.

Two pieces of blood-stained cloth found at the scene of a case of housebreaking and robbery with violence were positively identified as having been torn from the lining of a gaberdine coat which was being worn by a suspect when intercepted at a port as he was about to leave the country.

In a "hit and run" accident a pattern found in dust on the panel of a motor car was identified as being made by a corduroy trousers worn by a deceased.

In the case of an air disaster off the west coast of Ireland members of the Technical Bureau attended at Galway where they photographed and fingerprinted the bodies of 34 victims.

(5) RADIO.

The W.H.F. radio equipment, aided by the "999" call system continued to give satisfactory service during the year.

19,999 "999" calls were received during the year resulting in the arrest of 643 offenders. The increased number of calls received on this service shows that the public are aware of the utility of the service.

Car patrols in the Dublin Metropolitan area and the area comprising the Dublin-Wicklow Division were responsible for making offenders amenable for the following types of offence:-

With a view to improving our "999" call and radio control system, a thorough investigation has been conducted into its operation and a study is to be made of corresponding systems in Britain.

(6) CRIME PREVENTION ADVISORY SERVICE.

In order to reduce the incidence of crime in general and crime against property in particular, it has been decided to establish a Crime Prevention Advisory Service in Dublin, whose function it will be to advise the public at large and individuals in particular cases as to action they might take which would render crime, and especially crime against property, more difficult to commit.

(7) TRAINED POLICE DOGS.

Active consideration is being given to a proposal to introduce the use of trained police dogs and a study is being undertaken of the use of such dogs by police in other countries.


