Incidence of Crime in Garda Divisions.

(7) Appendix C. gives the number of crimes recorded and detected in the 20 Garda Divisions into which the State is divided. It gives similar information in respect of the Garda Districts in which the cities of Cork, Limerick, Waterford and Galway are included.

Dublin Metropolitan Division.

(8) The following table shows the numbers of offences recorded in the Dublin Metropolitan Division and in the rest of the State in the years 1958 and 1959 :-

Murder - Of Persons aged above One Year.

(12) Eight murders of persons aged above one year were recorded in 1959 and proceedings were instituted in seven cases. In 1958 the number of murders was four. Particulars of the eight cases in 1959 are given in Appendix D.

Murder - Of Infants aged one year and under.

(13) No crime under this heading, was recorded in 1959. Two crimes were recorded in 1958.

Infanticide.

(14) One crime of Infanticide was recorded in 1959 as compared with four in 1958. Particulars of the 1959 case are given in Appendix D.

Attempt to Murder.

(15) One crime was recorded in 1959 as compared with three in 1958. Particulars of the case are given in Appendix D.

Threats to Murder.

(16) One crime of Threatening to Murder was recorded in 1959, as compared with 2 in 1958. Particulars of the 1959 case are given in Appendix D.

Manslaughter (other than traffic fatalities).

(17) Two crimes of Manslaughter (other than traffic fatalities) were recorded in 1959 - the same number as in 1958. Particulars of the 1959 cases are given in Appendix D.

Manslaughter (Traffic Fatalities).

(18) Nineteen cases of Manslaughter arising from traffic fatalities were recorded in 1959 as compared with 42 in 1958. Proceedings were instituted in 18 cases and in one case a conviction was recorded. Two cases are shown awaiting trial.

Woundings, Assaults, etc.

(19) The number of offences under this heading recorded in 1959 was 307 as compared with 267 in 1958. Proceedings were instituted in 294 cases and in an additional four cases the offenders were detected but proceedings were not taken. Convictions were recorded in 214 cases and in a further 39 cases the charges were proved but the Probation of Offenders Act was applied. Thirty-two cases are shown pending.

Intimidation.

(20) Thirteen offences of Intimidation were recorded in 1959, as compared with twenty-five in 1958. Proceedings were instituted in three cases and there were two convictions.

Sexual Offences against Females.

(21) Sexual offences against females totalled 171 in 1959 as compared with 149 in 1958. Proceedings were instituted in 143 cases and convictions recorded in 102 cases.

Group II - Offences against Property with Violence.

- (22) Included in this group are offences of Burglary, Housebreaking and related offences, Robbery and Malicious Injury to Property.
- (23) The number of offences recorded in 1959 was 3,824 as compared with 3,645 in 1958. The increase occurred mainly in Housebreaking offences.
- (24) Comparative figures of offences and proceedings in the years 1954 to 1959 inclusive, are given in the following table.

Burglary and Housebreaking.

- (25) The number of Burglary and Housebreaking and related offences (including attempts to break into houses and possession of housebreaking tools) recorded in 1959 was 3,607 as compared with 3,459 in 1958.
- (26) The following table gives comparative figures of offences and proceedings in the years 1954 to 1959 inclusive.

Robbery.

- (27) Fifty-nine offences of Robbery and Assaults with intent to Rob were recorded in 1959 as compared with 61 in 1958. Proceedings were instituted in 41 cases. There were convictions in 36 cases and in 4 cases the charges were proved, but the Probation of Offenders Act was applied.
- (28) Firearms were used in 4 cases. Particulars of these cases and of 5 other serious cases are given in Appendix E.

Arson and Other Malicious Injury to Property.

- (29) The number of offences of Arson, etc., recorded in 1959 was 154, as compared with 118 in 1958. Offences of Arson totalled 82, as compared with 55 in 1958 and Other Malicious Injuries to Property 72, as compared with 63 in 1958.
- (30) Proceedings were instituted in 80 cases. Convictions numbered 34 and in a further 31 cases the charges were proved but the Probation of Offenders Act was applied. Eleven cases are shown pending.

Group III - Offences against Property without Violence.

(31) Included in this group are offences of Larceny, Embezzlement, Obtaining Goods, etc., by False Pretences, Frauds and Receiving Stolen Goods.

- (32) A total of 13,270 offences was recorded in the Group in 1959, as compared with 12,219 in 1958. This shows an increase of 1,051 of which 889 were larcenies.
- (33) Proceedings were instituted in 5,058 cases. Convictions were recorded in 2,164 cases and in 2,346 other cases the charges were proved but the Probation of Offenders Act was applied.
- (34) Comparative figures in respect of all offences in Group III in the years 1954 to 1959 inclusive are given hereunder.

- (36) Of the larcenies recorded in 1959 the number recorded in the Dublin Metropolitan Division was 9,294, or 73% of the total.

Embezzlement.

(37) Twenty-nine offences of Embezzlement were recorded in 1959, as compared with 22 in 1958. Proceedings were instituted in 27 cases. Convictions were recorded in 9 cases and in a further 11 cases the charges were proved but the probation of Offenders Act was applied.

Obtaining Goods, etc., by False Pretences.

(38) Two hundred and eighty-two offences of "False pretences" were recorded in 1959 as compared with 201 in 1958. Proceedings were instituted in 217 cases. Convictions were recorded in 107 cases and in a further 70 cases the charges were proved but the Probation of Offenders Act was applied.

Frauds.

(39) Eighty-five offences relating to Frauds were recorded in 1959, as compared with 40 in 1958. Proceedings were instituted in 70 cases. Convictions numbered 34 and in a further 22 cases the charges were proved but the Probation of Offenders Act was applied.

Receiving Stolen Goods.

(40) A total of 219 offences of Receiving Stolen Goods was recorded in 1959 as compared with 190 in 1958.

Proceedings were instituted in 205 cases. There were 89 convictions and in 66 other cases the charges were proved but the probation of Offenders Act was applied.

group IV - Offences not included in the other Groups.

- (41) Included in this group are offences of Forgery and Uttering, Perjury, Bribery, Riot and Unlawful Assembly, offences against Public Decency, Attempting to Commit Suicide, offences under the Coinage Acts, the Treason Act, the Offences Against the State Act and other indictable offences not included in Group I, II or III.
- (42) A total of 184 offences was recorded in 1959, as compared with 145 in 1958. Proceedings were instituted in 142 cases. Convictions numbered 68 and in 42 other cases the charges were proved but the Probation of Offenders Act was applied.

Organised Crimes of Violence.

- (43) Eight organised crimes of violence were recorded in 1959, of which seven were agrarian and one political. In the year 1958 ten organised crimes of violence were recorded, eight of which were agrarian and two political.
- (44) particulars of the political crime in 1959 are given in Appendix E. Of the seven agrarian crimes, four were recorded in one area in Co. Offaly, where there is agitation for the division of land. In one case an unoccupied dwellinghouse was destroyed by fire, in another, 10 tons of hay in an enclosed shed were burned. In a further case, Gardaí who found men driving cattle off land in dispute, were assaulted when they tried to put the cattle back. In the fourth case a detonator which had been fastened to the engine of a tractor exploded when the engine was started, causing damage to the engine and to the driver's hand, Of the remaining three offences, one was committed in Co. Tipperary, where an unoccupied single-story house was burned down, warning notices were painted on gate piers and three gates were removed. One was committed in Co. Kildare, where a house in the course of construction, was damaged by fire, and one was committed in Co. Galway, where a gate was removed and cattle and sheep driven off lands.

value of property stolen and recovered.

- (45) The total value of property recorded as stolen in 1959 was £200,961, as compared with £187,784 in 1958. The total value of property recovered in 1959 was £54,767, as compared with £53,575 in 1958.
- (46) In offences against property with violence (e.g. housebreakings) the value of property reported as stolen was £81,613 as compared with £71,488 in 1958. The value of property recovered in 1959 was £21,108, as compared with £20,353 in 1958.
- (47) In offences against property without violence (e.g. larcenies) the value of property reported as stolen was £119,348 as compared with £116,296 in 1958, and the value recovered, £33,658, as compared with £33,222 in 1958.
- (48) The following table shows, in respect of the years 1954 to 1959 inclusive, the total numbers of offences in which property was stolen and the numbers of offences in which property of different values were stolen.

NON-INDISTABLE OFFENCES - PERSONS PROSECUTED.

prosecutions.

(50) The number of persons prosecuted for non-indictable offences in 1959 was 88,819, as compared with 82,876 in 1958. The increase of 5,943 arose mainly from an increase of 4,715 prosecutions for offences under the Highway Acts.

Convictions.

(51) The number of persons found guilty was 82,761 or 93% of the number prosecuted. Of these, 68,604 were convicted: the charges against 13,953 were proved but the Probation of Offenders Act was applied.

Details of Offences.

(52) Details of the offences are given in Appendix F.

Assaults.

(54) In 1959, 1,238 persons were prosecuted for offences of Assault as compared with 1,233 in 1956.

Dogs - Offences in relation to Licensing of.

(55) The number of persons prosecuted for keeping unlicensed dogs in 1959 was 3,535 as compared with 4,200 in 1958.

School Attendance Act,

(56) A total of 2,962 persons were prosecuted in 1959 for offences under the School Attendance Act as compared with 3,307 in 1958.

Highway Acts, including Road Traffic Act and Road Transport Acts.

- (57) Prosecutions under the Highway Acts in 1959 numbered 54,428, as compared with 49,703 in 1958. They amounted to 61% of all prosecutions for non-indictable offences. 8,945 were for road tax and driving licence offences, 894 for Road Transport Acts offences and the remaining 44,589 for Road Traffic Act 1933 and other road offences.
- (58) The following tables give comparative figures for the years 1954 to 1959 inclusive in respect of total Highway Acts offences, offences against lighting regulations, driving while drunk and dangerous and careless driving.

Intoxicating Liquor Laws.

(59) Prosecutions under the Intoxicating Liquor Laws totalled 16,887 in 1959 as compared with 14,383 in 1958. Of the prosecutions in 1959, 11,517 or 68% were against persons found on licensed premises during closing hours, 1,585 or 9% were for simple drunkenness and 1,407 or 8% for drunkenness with aggravations. Prosecutions of licensed persons for offences against closing regulations numbered 1,581 or 9%.



MURDER, INFANTICIDE, ATTEMPTS TO MURDER, THREATS TO MURDER AND MANSLAUGHTER.

Particulars of Cases.

Murders (8 cases).

Co.Kerry. On 15th November 1958 the dead body of a 46 year old farmer, who had been missing from his home from 8th November 1958 was found concealed in a drain near his home. A post-mortem examination of the body disclosed facial injuries and the cause of death as manual strangulation.

Co. Kilkenny. On 20th November 1958 the naked dead body of a 5½ year old boy was found in a stream about ½ mile from the public road. Death was due to manual strangulation and the body bore signs of sexual assault. A 21 year. old man was convicted of the murder and sentenced to death. The sentence was commuted to imprisonment for life.

Co. Limerick. On 29th December 1958 at 6 a.m., the dead body of a 44 year old married woman was found in the kitchen of her home. There were extensive bruises and skin abrasions on her face, arms, legs and body. There were also two puncture wounds in the lower portion of the body. Her husband, a 59 year old farmer and publican, was convicted of the murder and was sentenced to death. The sentence was commuted to imprisonment for life. The crime was the outcome of a domestic quarrel while the accused was in a drunken condition.

Dublin City. On 13th January 1959 at 7.30 p.m. a 26 year old unemployed labourer, put his two children, aged 2 years and 7 months into a pram, took them to the ranal nearby and pushed them into a lock from which the bodies were later recovered. He was committed to a mental hospital by order of the Minister for Justice.

Co. Kilkenny. On 19th January 1959 at 8.30 p.m. a 68 year old widow was found unconscious lying in a pool of blood in the kitchen of her home, having obviously received a severe beating with a heavy weapon. Her home had been ransacked. She was removed to hospital where she died some hours later. A 26 year old labourer was convicted of the murder and sentenced to death. The sentence was commuted to imprisonment for life. He was subsequently found to be insane and was committed to the Criminal Lunatic Asylum.

Co.Sligo. On 16th April 1959 at 3.30 a.m. a 61 year old widow was found lying over a low hedge cutside her cottage home by a neighbour, who had heard her shouting. She had a wound on her head. Help was summoned and she was removed to hospital where she died at 7.15 a.m. A piece of metal piping bearing bloodstains was found nearby. A youth of 15½ years was convicted of the murder and ordered to be detained during the pleasure of the Government. The attack on the deveaged occurred when she surprised the youth attempting to break into her home.

Co. Louth. On 21st April 1959 at about 2.30 p.m. a 35 year old mill-worker was fatally wounded by a .22 rifle bullet while working in the garden at his home. A 60 year old labourer was arrested and charged with the murder. He was later certified insane and was committed to a mental hospital.

Co. Meath. On 9th May 1959 at about 6.30 a.m. a 50 year old farmer was shot dead in the kitchen of his home by his wife, aged 40 years. The weapon used was a shotgun. This woman had spent some time in a mental hospital and for a while before this occurrence was in a very nervous state. The deceased was about to leave for Dublin with a load of hay and she objected to his going. She was arrested and charged with the murder but was later found to be insane and was committed to a mental hospital by order of the Minister for Justice.

Infanticide (1 case).

Co. Donegal. On 25th May 1959 a 20 year old student nurse, on holidays from England where she was employed, gave birth to an illegitimate female infant in her parents home. She caused the infant's death by tying a piece of ribbon tightly around its neck. She was convicted of Infanticide and sentenced to six months imprisonment, suspended on her entering into recognizances to be of good behaviour for five years.

Attempt to Murder (1 case).

Co. Wexford. On 29th August 1959 at about 8 a.m. a 48 year old labourer attacked his wife, aged 27 years, in their home. He beat her with his clenched fists and attempted to strangle her, first with his hands and then with a neck-tie which he knotted around her neck. He was certified insane and was committed to a mental hospital.

Threat to Murcar (1 case).

Co. Louth. On 25th October 1958 the Resident Medical Superintendent of a mental hospital received a letter, bearing a London postmark, in which the writer stated he would come over and kill him. The writer was identified as a former patient of the mental hospital. He was arrested on warrant and while on remand was certified insane and committed to a mental hospital. He was later discharged from hospital and on appearance before the Court pleaded guilty. He was released on recognizances to be of good behaviour for two years.

Manslaughter (other than Traffic Fatalities) (2 cases).

Co. Monaghan. On 27th June 1958 a 21 year old domestic servant put her illegitimate male child, aged 5 months, into a sack and drowned him in a bog drain. The crime was discovered in November 1958 following enquiries about the disappearance of the baby. The offender was arrested and sent for trial on a charge of murder to which she pleaded "Not Guilty". A plea of manslaughter was entered on her behalf, which was accepted by the State, and she was sentenced to imprisonment for fifteen months.

Co. Waterford. On 6th April 1959 at 8.20 a.m. a 45 year old patient in a mental hospital was assaulted by a 21 year old patient, who struck him about the head and body with a mop handle inflicting fatal injuries. The assailant was charged with Manslaughter. He was found to be insane and was committed to the Criminal Lunatic Asylum.

ROBBERY.

Particulars of 4 Cases of Robbery with Firearms and 5 other serious Cases.

With Firearms (4 cases).

Co. Clare. On 1st October 1958 two men entered a post-office. One of them disconnected the telephone while the other produced a revolver and demanded £5 from the assistant, who handed him £2. They then left the premises. A third man had remained outside. Three young men were arrested and were sentenced to 3 years' penal servitude, 2 years' imprisonment with hard labour and 18 months' imprisonment with hard labour respectively. They had been concerned in the commission of other crimes.

Dublin City. On 5th January 1959 two young men, one of whom was armed with a revolver, entered a city premises, held up the proprietor and his son using threats of violence, and took away Boy Scout uniforms. The motive was political. The men were arrested and each received a sentence of three months' imprisonment, which was, in the case of one of them, suspended on his entering into recognizances to be of good behaviour.

Dublin City. On 31st January 1959 two men, one of whom was armed with a revolver, entered the premises of a provision merchant, compelled the manager and an assistant to enter a toilet, which they locked, and made off with a sum of £513.8.1. the property of the firm. No arrest was made in this case.

Dublin City. On 6th March 1959 a man, carrying a double-barrelled shot-gun under his overcoat, entered a tobacconists shop and pointing to the assistant said "This is a hold-up". As he did so a customer entered the shop, whereupon the gunman backed towards the door and dashed away. No arrest was made in this case.

Other Serious Cases (5).

Co. Dublin. On 6th October 1958 a motor van was held up. It was conveying to a bank a lodgment consisting of £441.9.10. in cash and cheques, money orders, etc., for £2,532.4.5. The cash, cheques, etc., were all taken. It was found that two stolen cars bearing false number plates were used in the commission of the offence. No arrests were made.

Dublin City. On 13th February 1959 a room in a tenement house occupied by a 94 year old widow, was entered by a man, who assaulted the old woman and knocked her on a bed. A second person entered and extracted a glove containing £145 from inside the old woman's blouse. Two men and two women were charged and convicted of the crime. The men received sentences of two years' imprisonment with hard labour: the women, estences of three months' imprisonment.

Dublin City. On 20th April 1959 a bookmaker's premises was entered by a man who produced a long knife at the assistant and grabbed a case containing about £90. A man was convicted and sentenced to imprisonment for two years with hard labour.

Dublin City. On 22nd May 1959 a 33 year old man was assaulted in the public street and robbed of cash and property valued £37 by three young men. Three arrests were made. Two of the accused were sentenced to three years' Borstal Detention and the third to imprisonment for two years with Hard Labour.

Co. Cork. On 24th May 1959 two youths entered a petrol filling station in Cork City. After they had conversed with the attendant for a short time one of them produced a knife and robbed the sum of £29.10.0. from the cash till. Two youths were convicted and were sentenced to Reformatory School for 3 years and 2 years.
