REPORT ON CRIME 1974

Forty thousand and ninety-six (40,096) indictable offences were recorded during the crime accounting year 1974 an increase of 2,074 or 5.5% over the previous year when the figure was 38,022. A downward trend of 3.1% recorded in 1973, was reversed, and while this is to be regretted it is only in keeping with the general trend of rising crime rates in many other countries.

Overall detection rate of 48.1% shows a slight improvement (0.5%) over that for 1973.

The number of murders was the highest yet recorded in any one year - 51 in all. This figure includes 33 victims of car bomb blasts in Dublin (26) and Monaghan (7) on the 17th May, 1974.

Offences against property with violence increased by 9.9%, the targets here being dwellinghouses (4,596) and shops, offices, factories, warehouses, etc. (5,487). Armed robberies, at 127, showed a slight increase over the number for 1973 (123). Un-armed robberies, however, were down by 50 from 496 in 1973 to 446 in 1974 as also were larcenies from the person from 1,356 to 881 — a reduction of 475. Assaults on Gardai on duty increased from 323 in 1973 to 423 in 1974.

Larcenies of motor cars decreased from 293 in 1973 to 214 in 1974 but pedal cycles went up from 2,028 to 2,866, and larcenies from unattended vehicles from 6,698 to 7,098. The total of offences arising from receiving stolen property was 521, compared with 573 in 1973.

The value of property stolen amounted to £7,335,656, of which property value £5,428,666 was recovered, including a valuable collection of paintings worth an estimated £5 million.

The overall increase in crime figures over the previous year is not great, but the general level of serious crime and vandalism in the community is a cause of concern. I should like to see more attention given to aspects of policing which relate to the prevention of crime and offences. This is difficult to achieve in prevailing conditions when so many members of the force have to be employed on duties of a security nature, the necessity for which is likely to continue for some considerable time.

In this situation it is more than ever necessary that the people should do everything possible to help the Gardai in the prevention and detection of crime. At present consideration is being given to the setting up of a Community Relations Bureau at Crime Branch Headquarters, the aim of which would be to enlist the support of the community in the prevention of crime and the maintenance of peace and good order. It is my view that for the future much more emphasis will have to be placed on this aspect of police work.

My thanks are due to members of the Press, Radio and Television and to the general public for the help and co-operation given to the Force throughout the year.

As and from the 1st January, 1975, the crime accounting year will be the calendar year, which heretofore ran from 1st October to 30th September. Crimes recorded during last quarter of 1974 are given in the report, but are shown separately and are not included in the figures quoted above.



Report on Crime 1974

INDICTABLE OFFENCES

- 1.1 The number of indictable offences which came to the notice of the Garda Siochana during the year ended 30th September, 1974, was 40,096, compared with 38,022 in 1973, an increase of 2,074 (5.5%). (Appendix A).
- 1.2 As and from 1st January, 1975, the accounting year for indictable crimes will be the calendar year, that is, from 1st January each year to 31st December of that year. Consequently a second return is included for the last quarter of the calendar year 1974. (Appendix C).



1.3 The figures for indictable offences are broken down in the following table:-

Dublin Metropolitan Area:

- 1.5 In the Dublin Metropolitan Area 22,557 crimes were recorded, an increase of 600 (2.7%) on the figures for 1973. Of the total crime recorded 56.3% occurred in the Dublin Metropolitan Area.
- 1.6 The Dublin Metropolitan Area has an estimated population of 829,660, or 28% of the total population of the State.



Detection of Crime.

- 1.8 The overall detection rate was 48.1% (47.6% in 1973). The rate varies from 86.8% in offences against the person to 41.3% in the less serious forms of larceny.
- 1.9 The total number of offences detected was 19,287. Proceedings were taken in 17,081 cases. 832 cases were dealt with under the Juvenile Liaison Officer Scheme.

Offences Against The Person.

2.1 Murder, manslaughter, dangerous driving causing death, traffic fatalities, assault and related offences fall into this category. 1,709 such offences were recorded, an increase of 3.3% on 1973, with a detection rate of 86.8% (90% in 1973).

Dublin Metropolitan Area

2.2 The overall figure of 1,709 "offences against the person" includes 593 (34.7%) such offences committed in the Dublin area with a detection rate of 74% (82.6% in 1973).

Murder:

- 2.3 The number of murders, 51, (21 in 1973) was the highest recorded since the foundation of the State. This figure includes the 33 victims of car bomb blasts at Dublin (26) and Monaghan (7) on the 17th May, 1974.
- 2.4 Manslaughter:



Traffic Fatalities:

- 2.5 Of 554 road traffic fatalities nine cases were recorded as manslaughter.
- 2.6 45 persons (67 in 1973) were charged with dangerous driving causing death and 24 persons (37 in 1973) were charged with dangerous driving causing serious bodily injury.

Offences against Property with Violence:

3.1 Offences of burglary, housebreaking, robbery, arson and serious malicious damage to property are included in this category. 12,973 such offences, an increase of 9.9% on 1973, with a detection rate of 52.3% (50.7% in 1973) were recorded.

Dublin Metropolitan Area:

3.2 The overall figure of 12,973 recorded "offences against property with violence" includes 7,013 (54.1%) committed in the Dublin Area, with a detection rate of 56.5% (53.8% in 1973).

Robbery:

3.3 The number of robberies recorded was 573, forty-six less than in 1973. Of this number 127 (123 in 1973) were cases of armed robbery. Criminal proceedings were taken in 277 cases, a detection rate of 48.3% (56.5% in 1973).

3.4 Arson and Malicious Damage:

There were 505 cases of malicious damage, and 262 (51.9%) cases were detected. The total figure includes 122 offences of arson. In 1973, out of a total of 526 cases, 170 were offences of arson.



4.1 Offences Against Property Without Violence:

Larcenies and frauds of various kinds fall into this category: 24,345 offences, an increase of 3,3% on 1973, with a detection rate of 41.3% (41.3% in 1973),

4.2 Dublin Metropolitan Area:

The overall figure of 24,345 recorded offences against property, without violence included 14,503 (59.6%) offences committed in the Dublin area, with a detection rate of 31.8% (30.9%) in 1973).



- 4.4 The number of larcenies from unattended vehicles (7.098) was up 400 (6.0%) on the previous year.
- 4.5 Thefts of motor vehicles (451) were down 129 (22.2%) on the previous year. Pedal cycle thefts (2,866) were up by 838 (41.3%).

5.1 Other Indictable Offences:

This is a general crime group with a total of 1,069 offences of which Forgery makes up the bulk -815 cases. The overall figure increased by 6.9% on 1973 and the detection rate was 89.4% (90.3% in 1973), 448 of the 1,069 offences were committed in the Dublin Metropolitan Area with a detection rate of 86.4% (93% in 1973).

CRIME PREVENTION

Special Services

Crime Prevention Unit:

- 8.1 The Garda Crime Prevention Advisory Service has been extended to all Divisions throughout the country. Specially trained members are available in each Division to carry out crime prevention surveys of vulnerable premises and to advise the owners on security measures and procedures. Crime prevention advice leaflets relating to security of private dwellings, retail stores, pay offices, transit of cash on foot or by vehicle, etc., are available on request. Lectures and talks to interested groups are also provided.
- 8.2 The Crime Prevention Unit at Dublin Castle provides these services in the Dublin area. A variety of security hardware, such as burglar alarms, locks, safes, door and window security devices, etc., are on permanent display at the offices of the unit at "F" Block, Ship Street, Dublin Castle. The Unit at Dublin Castle assists in preparation of the Garda Patrol Television programme. During the year, 1974, this unit provided crime prevention exhibition stands at the following shows throughout the country: R.D.S. Spring Show, Ireland House, Crime/Fire Prevention Week, Arklow, Tralee, Cork, Clonmel, Sligo, Enniscorthy, Limerick and Kanturk.

Public Relations Office:

- 9.1 The Public Relations Office, which also provides a Press Service, was set up in 1971. As the public information function of the office is more widely known, its services are increasingly availed of by the Press, in the form of requests for information on incidents of crime, photographs, the supplying of material for feature articles on the work of the Force, and for interviews with selected members.
- 9.2 During the year under review, lectures on public relations by the P.R. Staff have been incorporated into training programmes at different levels within the Force. In addition, office personnel participated in many career guidance exhibitions in Dublin and throughout the country. They have also been active providing lectures to students, and community and vocational groups, on subjects relating to the Role of the Force, as well as participating in group discussions on kindred subjects.
- 9.3 Illustrated brochures and leaflets produced by the office are eagerly sought by Career Guidance Counsellors, teachers and parents.
- 9.4 Further plans provide for an increase in staff with a view to an extension of office hours to meet increasing demands.

Juvenile Liaison Officer Scheme:

10.1 Since the inception of the Juvenile Liaison Officer Scheme in 1963, 8,797 juvenile offenders have been cautioned and supervised by the Gardai.

- 10.2 A child or young person who becomes involved in crime (housebreaking, larceny and the like) may be dealt with under the Scheme as an alternative to court proceedings. Account is taken of the degree of temptation and any other aggravating or mitigating circumstances, and a caution may be given, provided:
 - (a) the offence is a minor one and is admitted;
 - the offender is under 17 years of age and has not previously come under the notice of the Gardai;
 - the parents or guardians agree to accept the help and advice of the Gardai;
 - (d) the injured party does not object to the procedure of caution rather than prosecution.
- 10.3 During 1974 a special study of the Juvenile Liaison Officer Scheme was carried out. Extensions of the Scheme of the role of Juvenile Liaison officers, is now being considered as a result of this study.

11.1 The '999' Emergency Service.

In 1974 the information room at Dublin Castle received 109,368 emergency '999' telephone calls, Cork City received 7,282 calls; Limerick City, 2,874 calls; Galway City, 54 calls and Waterford City, 354 calls.

12.1 Sub-Aqua Unit.

The Sub-Aqua Unit, disbanded in April 1972 pending the findings of a Working Party set up to examine their position, was re-established in July 1974 when 1 Sergeant and 12 Gardai started an 8 weeks course of training under the auspices and supervision of the Irish Underwater Council. The final stages of training were carried out in Clew Bay, Co. Mayo, and all members qualified for Club-Diver Certificates.

13.1 Traffic Corps.

14.1

The Traffic Corps, established in 1973, now operate in all Divisions and the downward trend in Traffic Accidents first noted in 1973 which continued in 1974 could be attributed to the activities of the Traffic Corps Units. Difficulties with judicial interpretation of the law and long delayed High Court decisions hampered the work of the Units in prosecuting offences relating to driving with blood alcohol concentration above the prescribed limit. Outside the D.M.A. there are now 18 Sergeants and 216 Gardai appointed wholetime to traffic control and accident prevention duties.

DRUGS SQUAD

- 16.1 During 1974, there was an increase in the number of persons charged with drug offences, 293 in 1974 as against 270 in 1973. Cannabis continues to be the most widely used drug.
- 16.2 Members of the Drugs Squad will be glad to give advice to parents and teachers on aspects of the drug problem affecting young people and indeed discussions with teachers, doctors and other professional groups have been a feature of their work for a long time. The policy of selecting members from Divisions outside the Dublin Metropolitan Area to undergo the attachment courses with the Drugs Squad continued during the year and members from all Divisions have now been given the benefit of these courses.
- 16.3 Sources of supply consist of smuggled drugs, drugs stolen from pharmacies in the course of housebreakings and drugs obtained on forged prescriptions.
- 16.4 Co-operation with the customs service, co-ordinating committee on drug abuse, the drugs advisory centres and medical personnel has continued throughout the year with beneficial results.
- 16.5 The Drugs Squad was represented at the National Conference of Drugs Squad Officers in Great Britain during 1974. Members of the Drugs Squad assist the Department of Health in their drug education programme.
- 16.6 A programme of lectures to recruits by members of the Drugs Squad has been initiated.
- 16.7 An information centre on all aspects of law enforcement in relation to drugs has been set up at Headquarters.

The Stolen Motor Vehicle Investigation Unit.

- 17.1 The Stolen Motor Vehicle Investigation Unit, which is attached to the Central Detective Unit at Dublin Castle was established in 1973 with a strength of one detective Sergeant and four detective Gardai. This unit had considerable success during 1974 in tracing motor vehicles, including motor forries, land rovers and even mechanical diggers, stolen, not alone within the State, but in Northern Ireland, Great Britain and the Continent. Close liaison is maintained with similar units in other countries, thus achieving surveillance of international traffickers in stolen motor vehicles.
- 17.2 During 1974, 451 such vehicles were stolen in the State, which figure is 129 (22.2%) less than during 1973. Unlawful takings of motor vehicles during the year amounted to 470.

NON-INDICTABLE OFFENCES

- 18.1 Appendix F sets out the position in relation to non-indictable offences during the crime accounting period 1974. In previous years this table related to the number of persons proceeded against for the various types of offences; this year it deals with the number of offences in which proceedings were taken.
- 18.2 As from 1st January 1975 the accounting year for summary offences will also be the calendar year. Consequently a separate return is included for the last quarter of the calendar year, 1974.
