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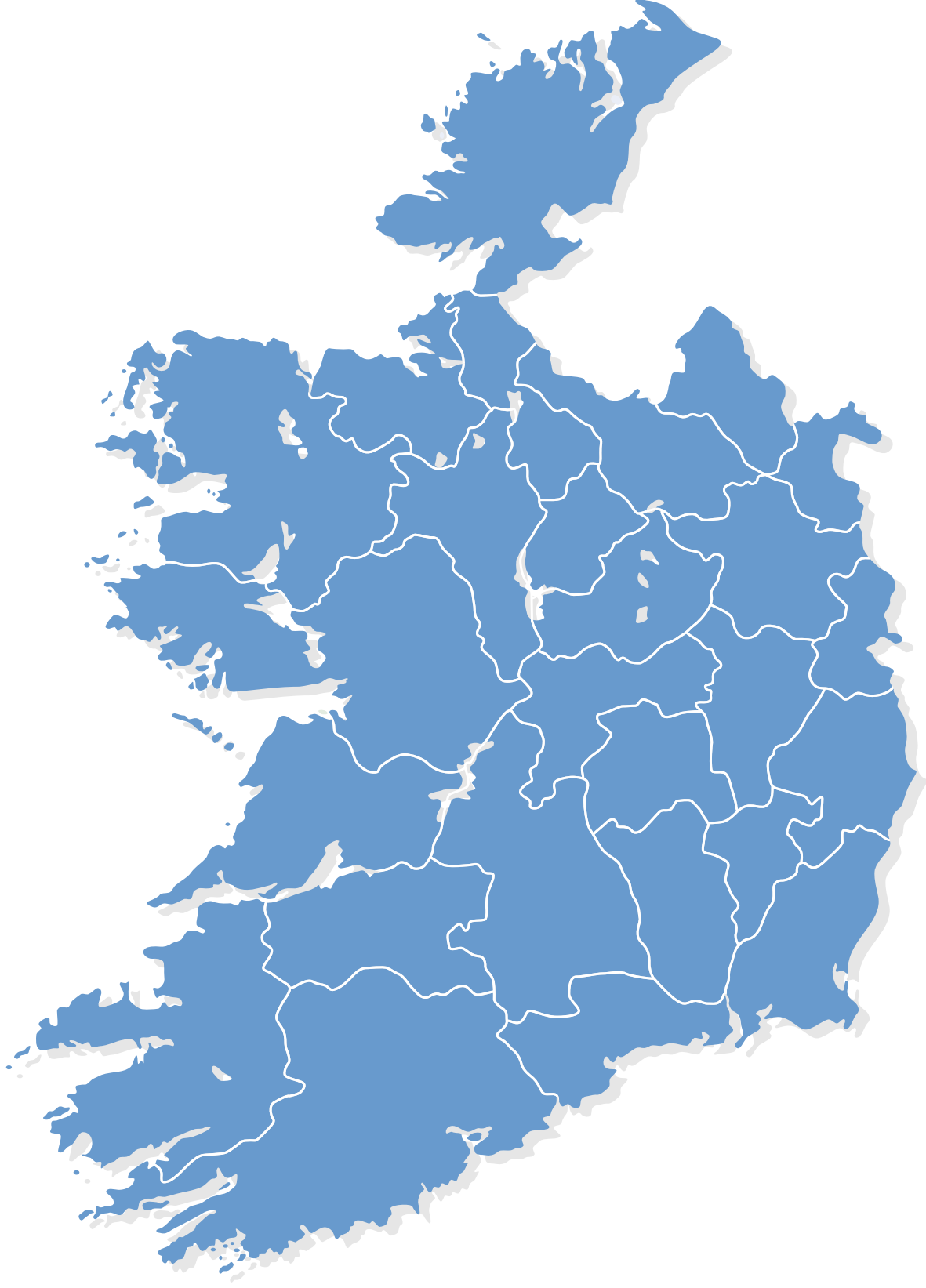

Commissioner Honours Patrick Walsh

Mr Patrick Walsh was a founder member of Neighbourhood Watch, with the launch of the Ard na Mara Neighbourhood Watch scheme in Malahide in 1985.

He has given 30 years continuous service to Neighbourhood Watch in various capacities including Area Co-ordinator of Ard na Mara, "R" District Neighbourhood Watch Chairperson, and Chairperson of the Dublin Neighbourhood Watch Regional Committee (D.N.W.R.C.).

However, the hallmark feature of Mr Walsh's service to Neighbourhood Watch has been his positive, energetic and constructive service to improving the identity and standing of Neighbourhood Watch. In challenging times he has steadfastly maintained his continued support for Neighbourhood Watch to the benefit of Neighbourhood Watch.

Mr Walsh made a number of particular contributions that are worth remembering and no more so than now:

- i. "The Challenge for the Future – Neighbourhood Watch" which was compiled as a forward thinking strategy for the organisation and development of Neighbourhood Watch, in 1997. Mr Walsh contributed a significant amount of time from his professional life over a 2 year period, which included travelling the length and breadth of the country to address Neighbourhood Watch Development Meetings.
- ii. "Police and Community: An Evaluation of Neighbourhood Watch and Community Alert in Ireland". As Chairperson of the DNWRC he assisted, contributed and supported this most comprehensive review of Neighbourhood Watch in Ireland. This document still stands as the most comprehensive document capturing the practice of social crime prevention programmes in Ireland.
- iii. "Task Force on Security for the Elderly": This Department of Social Welfare initiative made funding available to Neighbourhood Watch and Community Alert schemes in Ireland. Mr Walsh made a very significant practical contribution towards managing the direction of funding so that Neighbourhood Watch and Community Alert schemes

could directly access and utilise funding in a professional and accountable manner. This initiative alone contributed to activity levels within schemes throughout the country since the mid 1990's and helped improve life for so many older persons.

- iv. "Civic Receptions for Neighbourhood Watch" – numerous. Over the years Mr Walsh organised, behind the scenes, several public presentation ceremonies by the President of Ireland, Lord Mayor of Dublin and the Fingal Council Authority for those who have given good service to Neighbourhood Watch. This involved the presentation of Certificates as a mark of public gratitude for the outstanding civic mindedness of those who volunteer in our communities.

There are too many other contributions to mention but the series of D.N.W.R.C. Annual General Meetings that he sought sponsorship for and co-managed and which attracted hundreds of attendees (including observers from every Garda Region, Northern Ireland, and England) are particularly memorable. They helped to promote the identity of, and energise Neighbourhood Watch, and succeeded in drawing greater support for community co-operation with An Garda Síochána.

Mr Walsh's sincerity and loyalty in supporting Neighbourhood Watch is very much valued.

New Supply of Bogus Caller Cards

Home Instead Senior Care has once again partnered with An Garda Síochána by sponsoring the printing of 300,000 bogus caller cards for issue to the community.

There are many documented incidents of people representing themselves as Gardaí, local authority workers, ESB officials and others who have talked their way into homes of older people. Such people have deceived and stolen from older people, either by distracting them or by charging them for work that has not been carried out. The perpetrators of these crimes are very persuasive once they enter into conversation with their target.

The object of the Bogus Caller Card initiative is to empower the older person when dealing with unwanted or unknown callers. It helps to reduce the need for older people to engage in conversation with callers. While the primary advice is to not open the door to strangers, inevitably there are times when they will open the door and engage with these callers. Once the engagement begins, the perpetrator takes control of the situation and uses their skills to deceive their target.

To counteract this and to reduce the opportunity for this engagement, the National Community Policing

Office have produced a card based on the Cork City Community Policing initiative. The older person can give the card to unwanted callers advising them to leave their business card or contact details. This eliminates the need for any further conversation and provides the older person with a means to ending the conversation without argument or discussion. The genuine caller will have no difficulty with this proposal, and it should make life a little more complicated for the unwanted caller.

Some general advice is printed on the reverse side of the card:

- Do not open the door
- Use the door chain/limiter
- Give this card to the caller
- Do not enter into conversation
- Genuine callers will leave their details

The cards will be issued to Community Gardaí around the country this week, who will distribute them to older people in the community.

Home security, and burglary prevention were the focus of the Supporting Safer Communities Campaigns held during May and September of this year.

Figures from An Garda Síochána Analysis Service indicate a rise in the number of reported residential burglaries over the last year. They show that two out of three burglaries are residential burglaries.

The analysis also shows that on average over 50% of burglars enter through the rear of the home, and 20% enter through an unlocked door or window. In June this number rises to 30%.



Speaking at a campaign launch Sergeant Kelvin Courtney of the National Crime Prevention Unit said:

“Burglars like easy opportunities. If they have to make a lot of noise, spend a lot of time or risk being seen, the chances are they won’t bother. A good rule of thumb is the 3 minute delay test. If you can deny entry for 3 minutes or more – chances are the burglars will go elsewhere.

Robust doors and windows, properly fitted with quality locking systems present a good physical barrier to the burglar. However, if a door or window has been left open, their security qualities won’t make any difference.

Good neighbours are priceless, particularly when you’re going away. Leave a key with a trusted neighbour. Get them to collect your post and your deliveries if you haven’t already cancelled them. They might even leave their spare car in your drive way when you’re away. Remember the



burglar is looking for signs of an empty house so don’t give them any.

It’s always a good idea to join a Community Crime Prevention Programme like Neighbourhood Watch or Community Alert. There’s security in numbers.

The Home Security Checklist Challenge, available on the Garda website, is a simple survey that takes only a few minutes to complete and shows householders just how secure their home is.”

An Garda Síochána recommends that people take the following steps

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to reduce the chances of their home being burgled:

- Secure all doors and windows.
- Light up your home and use timer switches on lights for when you are out.
- Store keys safely and away from windows and letterboxes.
- Record details of valuables and don't keep large cash amounts at home.
- Use your alarm, even when you are at home.

The local Community



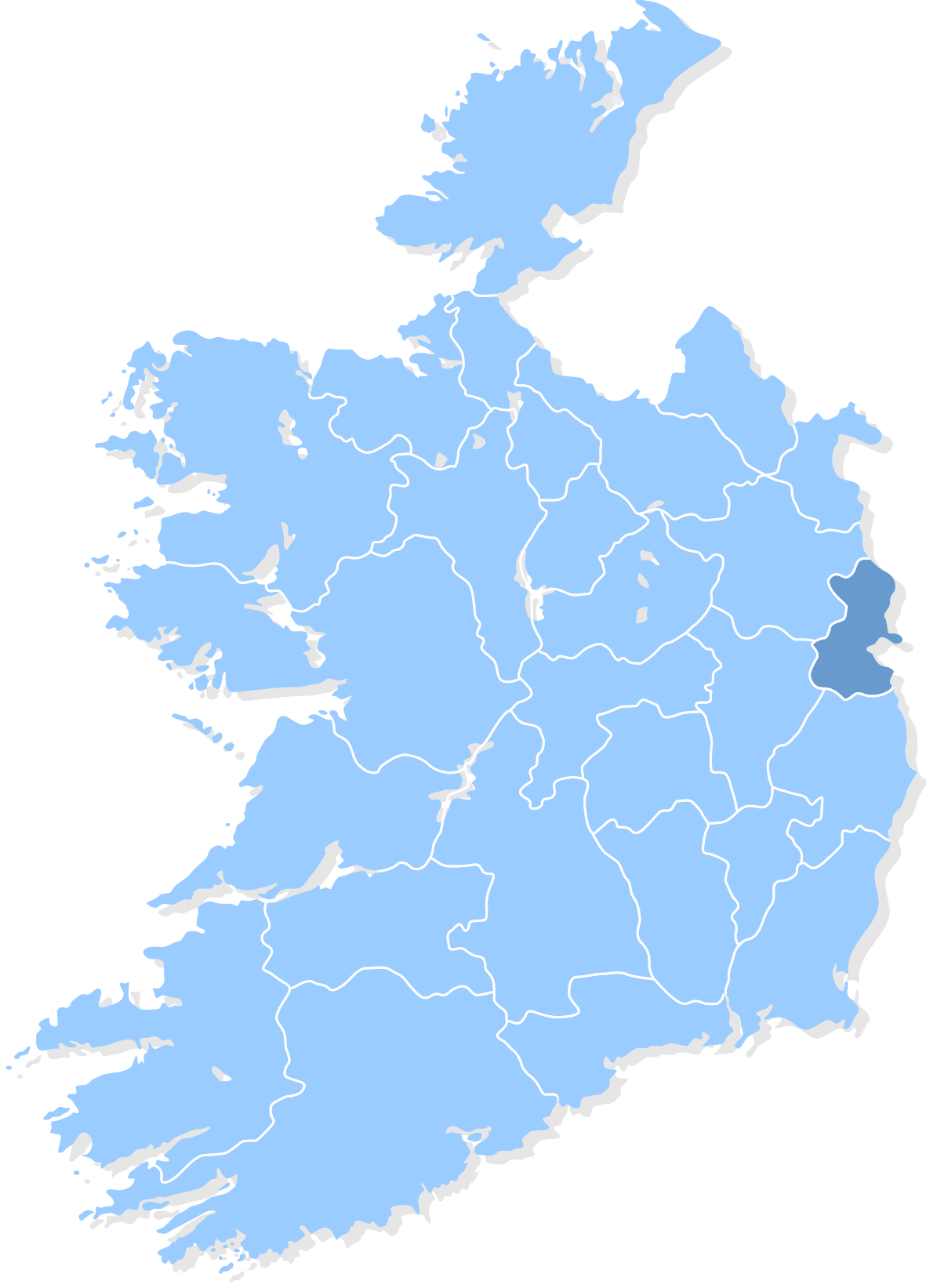
Garda visited the school of the 1st prize winner and presented the activity packs to each of the winners' classmates.

DART Patrol Joint Initiative

On Friday 25th September, 2015, a Preventative Burglary Patrol involving two Garda Divisions and DART personnel was performed between 12pm and 3pm.

The Gardaí - Community Policing "W" District (Sergeant McDonald, Gardaí Murray, Phelan and Gibbons), Community Policing Bray (Gardaí Heffernan, Carrick, Connolly and Saunderson), and Community Policing "F" District (Garda Greene) -

under the supervision of Sergeant Pat McDonald, and with the assistance of DART Personnel, performed the Preventative Burglary Patrol between Booterstown DART Station and Greystones DART Station.

As part of Supporting Safer Communities Week, the theme of "Preventative Burglary Patrol" was the main focus of the initiative, and it also encapsulated Social Welfare Fraud and Anti Social Behaviour.

Gardaí used this opportunity to highlight Burglary Prevention techniques. Over 500 "Illuminate to Eliminate" and "Home Security Checklist Challenge" leaflets were handed out to the public.

This joint Multi Agency operation between DART and An Garda Síochána was extremely successful, and gathered positive feedback from members of the public. It also showed high visibility presence on public transport.

Bike Theft Prevention Initiatives

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Nearly 6000 bikes are stolen every year, with highest percentage being in Dublin at nearly 75% of all thefts reported there.

Those who steal bikes are wide and varied, and can range from the opportunist who acts on the spur of the moment, taking an unlocked bike and selling it on for a small amount of money. Then there are the more organised individuals who are well equipped and organised. They have vans and effective lock breaking tools at their disposal. They usually sell the bikes on for near market price, and usually online. They may change some items such as the seat or pedals in an attempt to avoid detection.

The Local Policing Forum in Dun Laoghaire have used different approaches in an attempt to tackle these issues. They analysed the problem and considered numerous responses. What measures would address the location, the victim and the offender in one fell swoop? The answer came in the form of an oddly coloured bike with a message on it for all to see.

The Gardaí examined similar methods used in the United State and the UK, and the use of an "info bike" ticked all the boxes. Similar initiatives have

proven successful in the following jurisdictions:

- London Metropolitan Police - 33% reduction.
- British Transport Police - 45% reduction.
- Tulane University Police (US) - 40% reduction.

The Gardaí painted an 'end-of-life' bike and placed a sign on it with information for all to see. One side says "Gardaí monitoring this location" and the other side asks "Have you securely locked your bike?" The bike was then locked at an identified hot-spot for bike theft.

The bike has been greeted with many puzzled looks, but it has been devised taking into consideration the theories and concepts of environmental criminology. The bike attracts a lot of attention, which increases "natural surveillance". The bike, by definition, is Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED). For



such a odd looking bike, it achieves a lot of the desired goals which should ultimately lead to a reduction in bike theft - and this appears to be happening in Dun Laoghaire.

It was introduced in October 2014, and for the first 4 months of its use, coincided with a reduction of 25% compared to the previous three months in the Dun Laoghaire sub-District. Further assessment will be required to determine how much of these reductions can be directly attributed to the introduction of the "info bike".

Additional complimentary measures have also been put in place with the 'info bike' to maximise its effect. This includes full use of the town's CCTV system to ensure hot-spots are routinely monitored. Gardaí on beat duty include these hot-spots on their rounds with particular emphasis being placed on the racks where the info bike is placed. Plain-clothes members were also occasionally used to monitor hot-spots, and target known offenders as they entered the targeted locations.

Superintendent Martin Fitzgerald has praised the initiative, which has also led to the identification and arrest of offenders who specialise in this form of crime. "This has resulted from a

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collaborative approach taken by An Garda Síochána and Dun Laoghaire/Rathdown County Council. The challenge for An Garda Síochána is to actively participate in Government policy to nurture a safe cycling environment by providing assistance to local authorities and secondly, combat the correlated bike thefts”.

Inspector Thomas Condon agrees: “The “info bike” does a great job in educating the public as it uses a combination of a u-lock with a long cable. You should consider spending up to 10% of the total cost of your bike on security. The use of two security devices is a great idea as it’s an additional inconvenience for the determined thief and usually proves to be an effective deterrent. Using a U-lock and cable together also ensures you are locking both wheels and the frame to a fixed point such as a bike rack”.

The public can also play their part by ensuring they keep a record of all details of their bike such as the serial number, and an up to date photograph. There are also good online sites for registering details such as bikeregister.ie.

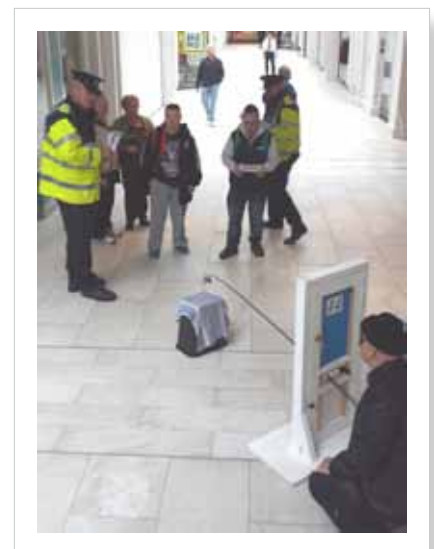


Rathmines Crime Awareness Day

Raheny/Clontarf Fair Play Tournament

A total of 220 children took part in the tournament on the day. This is the fifth consecutive year that the event has taken place.

The tournament was the culmination of fair play and anti racism program for nine local primary schools, which involved Gardaí and FAI officials giving 5th classes presentations on anti racism and fair play in sport. Approximately 400 pupils received the presentation.

The objective behind this initiative is to use sport to re-enforce the message of anti-bullying and anti-racism through inclusion, fair play and team building. Talks are based around the concepts delivered in the Garda Schools Program on personal safety and bullying, and through the FAI "show racism the red card" program.

7. Green Lanes National School, Seafield Ave, D.3
8. Scoil Assaim, All Saints Dr., D.5
9. Scoil Aine, All Saints Dr, D.5

The initiative is an excellent example of interagency co-operation, and one which works in tandem with the Garda schools program.

The agencies which played a role in the success of the event are;

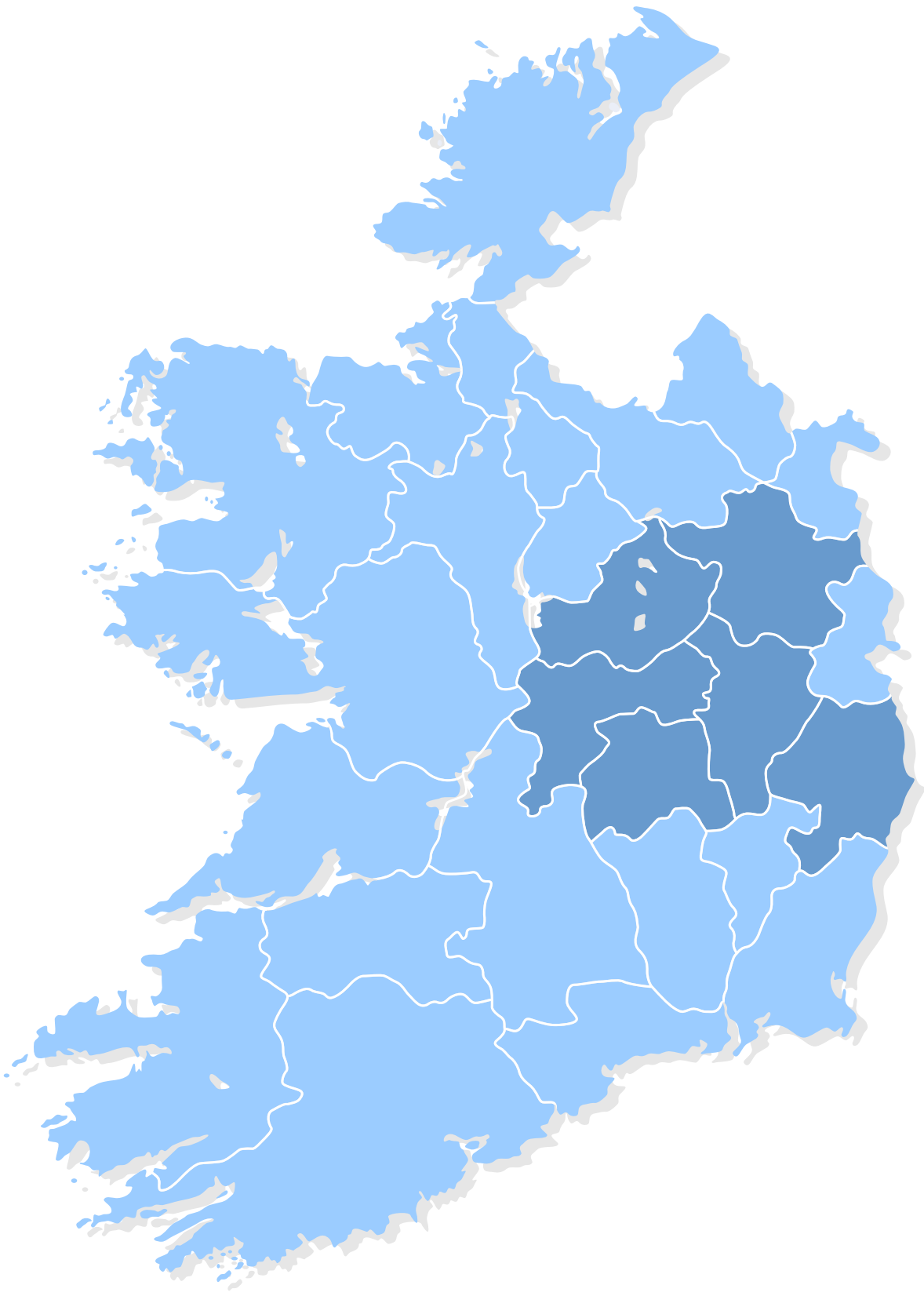
- An Garda Síochána – Providing medals, pencils, manpower and organisation.

Ashbourne Safer Cycling Initiative

On the 10th December 2014, Garda Ashling Connor received a “Leading Light” award from the Road Safety Authority in the emergency services’ category at Farmleigh House.

As the Community Garda for Ashbourne, Garda Connor had received complaints from members of the Ratoath community regarding the behaviour of some young people on bikes.

Garda Connor invited 6th class students of the Ratoath Senior National School, along with school principal Ms Lorraine Butler, to work with her on the issue. They came up with a ‘safer cycling initiative’.

Each child was issued with a bike licence, and a licence number which was to be displayed on their bike. The young people came up with three golden rules which had to be adhered to:

1. Always wear a helmet.
2. Dismount from bike before entering school grounds and.
3. Always obey the safe cross code.

A contract was drawn up by the students that both the cyclist and parent had to sign before being issued with the bike licence, and if a golden rule was broken a penalty

point was issued.

There was a limit of 3 penalty points within a week. The young people designed the bike licence, along with Michael Finnegan (former Chief Superintendent) Road Safety Officer for Meath Co. Co., and took ownership of this initiative.

The 6th class students also took on the role of ‘bike police’, and along with Garda Connor, patrolled the gates each morning and afternoon at school opening/closing times.

Garda Connor nominated this fantastic group of young people who put in so much work along with Ms Lorraine Butler for a leading light award for the ‘primary schools’ category which they won.

Other principals have heard about the initiative and want to start it with their own pupils. Ratoath pupils came up with the golden rules themselves and designed the licences, and above all complaints from the community have reduced as a result of this innovative school and Garda collaboration.

Garda Connor also delivers talks on road safety at her local parish church and at various community groups, and has demonstrated a strong commitment to road safety throughout her career.

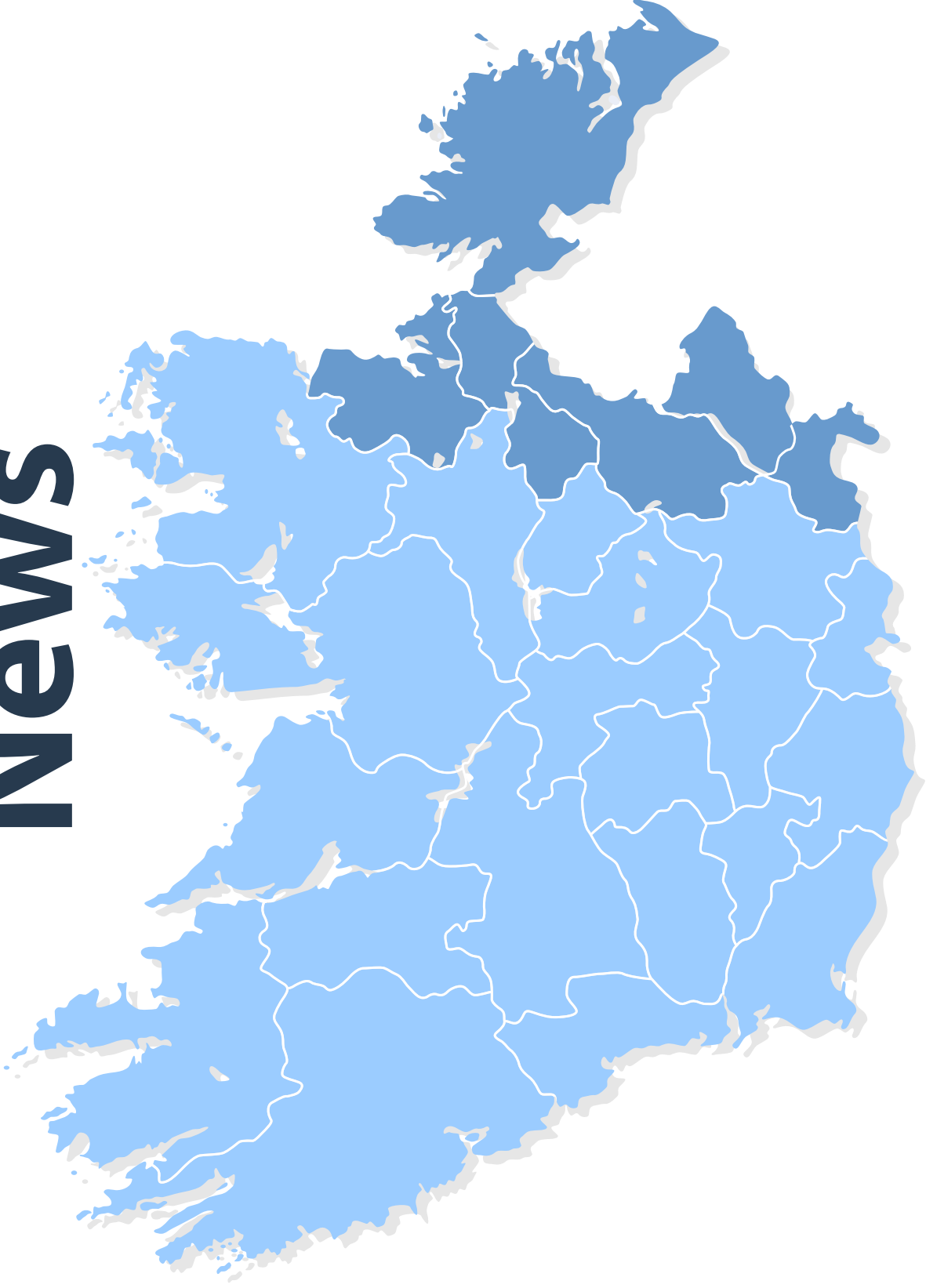

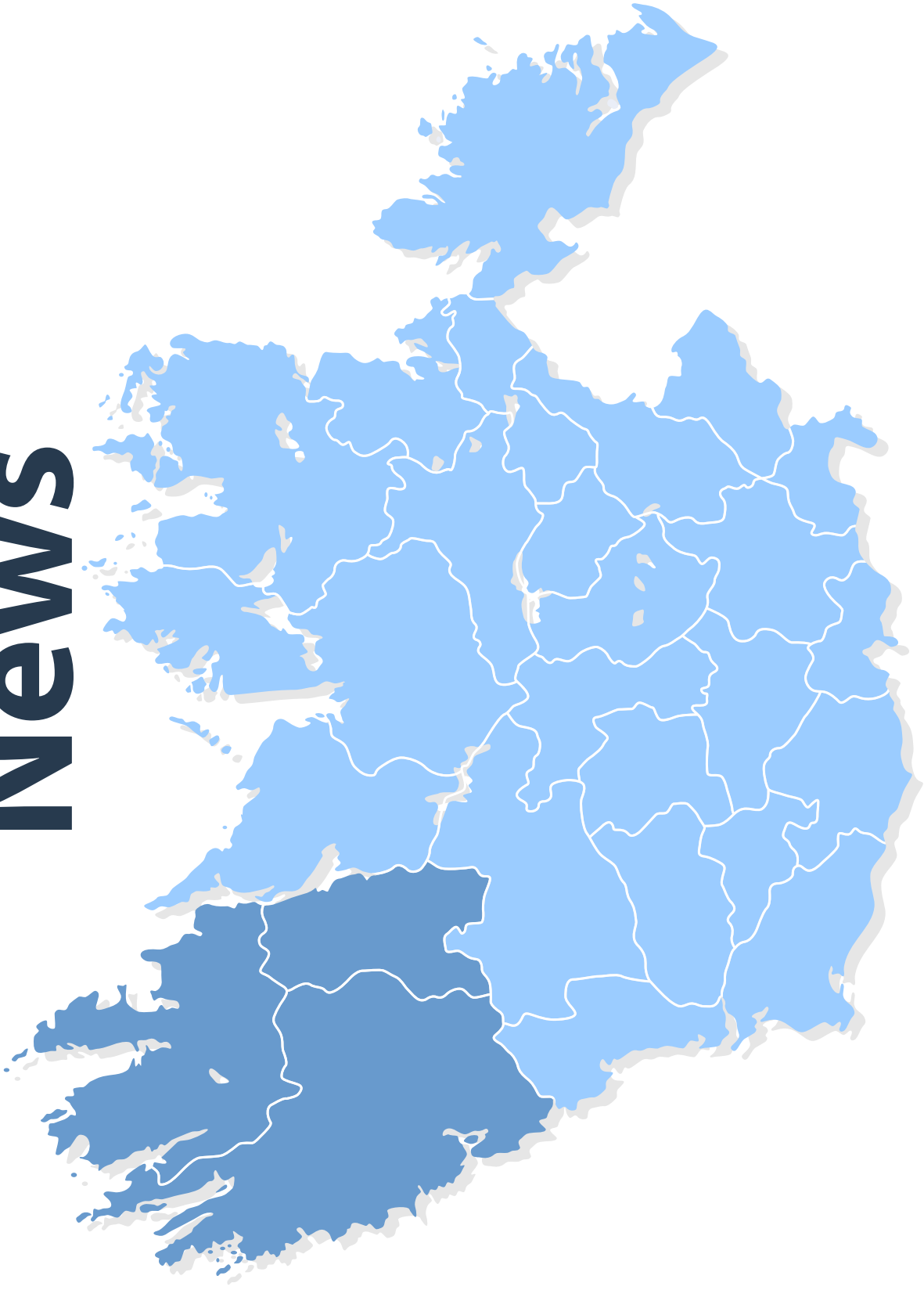

Launch of “Gardaí, Youth and the Law”

The launch of the booklet, titled “Gardaí, Youth and the Law”, was attended by parents, youth leaders, teachers, and young people from secondary schools, and community and voluntary organisations, from across the Cork West Garda Division. Judge James McNulty, District Court Judge for West Cork, and Councillor Alan Coleman, Mayor of County Cork, and Councillor Michael Collins were also present on the evening.

Chief Superintendent Tom Hayes officially launched the booklet, and went through the content. It included topics covering: Bullying, in particular Cyberbullying; Public Order; Theft and Fraud; Criminal Damage; Drugs

and Alcohol; and Road Safety issues.

Chief Superintendent Hayes said that the primary reason for the publication of the booklet was to create a better understanding of the law by young people.

Chief Superintendent Hayes acknowledged Kinsale Youth Support Services (KYSS), who acted as partner to An Garda Síochána in bringing the publication of the booklet to fruition.

Honor O’ Brien then spoke on behalf of Kinsale Youth Support Services (KYSS), and outlined the roll of KYSS. KYSS has a primary focus on creating a greater awareness of positive mental health, and Honor mentioned some of the events and talks that have been organised by KYSS. She also acknowledged that KYSS were delighted to be associated with the launch of the booklet with An Garda Síochána.

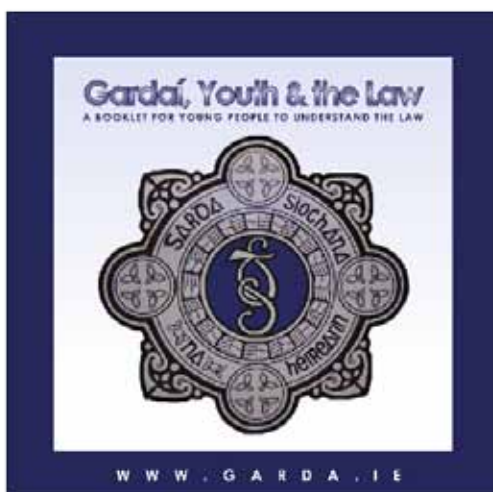
The guest speaker on the evening was Mr. Michael Pattwell, retired District Court Judge, who outlined some of his own experiences while District Court Judge and his interactions with young people. He also spoke about the consequences that bullying has on young people both in the

short and long term. Mr. Pattwell then concentrated on the consequences of crime, and in particular for the character of the offender. If any person receives a conviction, it has a major impact on their ability to travel, and he praised the work being carried out by the Gardaí and voluntary groups such as KYSS in keeping young people out of trouble.

Garda Damian White, Community Garda based in Bandon, was M.C. on the evening. He referenced that when many people encounter the Gardaí, they assume it is when something is wrong; there has been an accident or tragedy. Garda White reflected that much of the work done by An Garda Síochána is in keeping young people out of trouble, and not trying to get them into trouble.

Garda White also thanked their partners in the schools and community based organisations that provide such valuable support to the youth. It will be through those people on the ground that the 10,000 booklets will be distributed to get to the young people.

Joint Anti-Social Behaviour Initiative

In February 2013, Community Garda O'Neill was receiving a large number of calls to Mahon Point shopping centre in relation to antisocial behaviour. On most of the call outs the behaviour was more of a nuisance behaviour with no offence taking place. This made it difficult for Gardaí to deal with.

The behaviour was causing a considerable amount of concern to Mahon Point, in the running and safety of centre for both workers and shoppers. As the young people involved were from The May Project (the Garda Diversion project) Garda O'Neill made contact with the coordinator of the project and discussed meeting with the management at Mahon Point and also the JLO. Garda O'Neil organised the first meeting and all concerned discussed the matters arising. Mahon Point were willing to come on board to assist the project in dealing with the young people.

From this meeting, a number of discussions took place in an effort to look at the most effective way to deal with the behaviour as a joint approach to tackle the problem. The young people were aware that their behaviour was not necessarily coming under the Garda Diversion Programme, and in turn they felt that

they were getting away with it. It was decided that the parents of the young people would need to come on board also for the Joint action to work.

A decision was made to start with three young people and to invite them, their parents, Mahon Point Security Management, the JLO, Community Policing, and the Coordinator of the May Project. The aim was to meet in a restorative like meeting allowing each party to speak of how the behaviour was effecting them, and to give the young people a venue to discuss why they were behaving the way they were, or what in turn would help to change that behaviour.

The May Project were running a program called a "Life of Choices", so it was decided that this new initiative would come under the umbrella of the Life of Choices program. Throughout this process all parties had a number of meetings and derived a behavioural contract. This was agreed and signed by all parties. This initiative was on a trial and error basis.

To date, five young people have gone through the program proving quite positive for the last two young people. The first three young people engaged for a number of weeks, but

they then in turn stopped engaging, and so did their parents. However, the effects of the program have still reduced the antisocial behaviour and nuisance behaviour of young people, proving to be a positive outcome. The program is continuing to work with the young people, and in some cases it depends on what consequence will be most effective for each individual young person.

Garda O'Neill and the Coordinator, Evelyn Richardson, of the May Project have documented the program. It has been documented in an effort to assist other Garda Diversion programs in dealing with similar incidents in shopping centres like Mahon Point. While the initiative is under the umbrella of the Life of Choices program run through Foroige, it will only allow that other Garda Diversion Projects or Foroige run projects role out this same initiative.

Mizen Coastal Watch

Mizen Coastal Watch was launched on Friday 19th of June 2015 in the picturesque harbour village of Schull. This initiative was driven by Sergeant James O'Donovan and local Gardaí attached to Schull Garda Station, to assist in the prevention of the theft of marine equipment and leisure craft.

Theft of such equipment has occurred periodically on the peninsula over the years, and there has been an increase in numbers of these types of thefts over the summer months. The initiative is also aimed at promoting the reporting of suspicious activity of any vessels or boats on the Mizen Coast line.

The Mizen Peninsula can have anything up to 1000 boats and marine leisure crafts moored and docked at pontoons over the summer months. This is not taking into account boats or leisure equipment that may only be brought to the area for a short period of time.

The initiative was launched by Superintendent Brendan Fogarty of Bantry who acknowledged all the various agencies who were involved in the set up of the initiative namely: Cork County Council; R.N.L.I; Irish Water Safety; Schull In Shore Rescue;

Schull Community Council; Coast Guard; Crookhaven and Schull sailing clubs; and local Marine Centre; along with boatyard owners from across the locality. The Superintendent outlined how this initiative shows: the importance of bonds between all of the agencies along the Mizen peninsula; in working together in promoting for both Water Safety; and reducing the opportunities for Marine related thefts.

Sergeant Ian O'Callaghan, the Cork West Divisional Crime Prevention Officer, stated that such a new initiative will increase awareness amongst the boat owning and user community in the prevention of and reduction of thefts of marine equipment, and will give such persons useful tips to protect their property.

Sergeant James O'Donovan explained that the new Coastal Watch system is based on an email alert system. Crime prevention literature relating to boating and outboard security has been distributed electronically, and to marine centre outlets and shop in the locality.

This will be a two way communication flow where An Garda Síochána will encourage members of the public to contact them without delay on seeing suspicious activity along the

coast line. Mizen Coastal Watch will be utilised also in the distribution of Water Safety advice from Cork County Council and Irish Water safety.

Councillor Michael Collins, on behalf of the local community, complimented everybody for coming together in this worthwhile initiative.

Pupils from Scoil Mhuire primary school in Schull have designed a logo for the Mizen coastal Watch and the chosen design will be the recognisable emblem of the Mizen Coastal Watch.

National Job Shadow Initiative

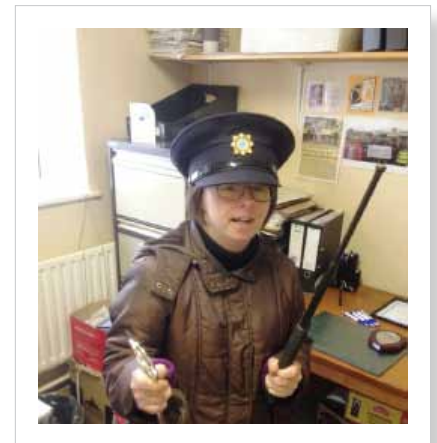
On the 11th of December 2014, Garda Damian Cleere held a Job Shadow Day in Thurles Garda Station.

Road Safety Education Initiative

Over the last 5 years there have been 62 road fatalities on Tipperary's roads. In 2014, 17 people lost their lives.

Members of the Tipperary Division Traffic Corps have produced a Road Safety programme that is dedicated to educating young drivers who have yet to experience driving on the roads, targeting in particular Transition Year students in schools from across Tipperary.

In October/December 2014, Traffic Corps members in the Division held a two day Road Safety Seminar at Rockwell College Cashel and the Garda College Templemore with students from schools in Thurles, Nenagh, Tipperary Town, Cahir and Clonmel Districts attending.

The 'It Won't Happen to Me', a road safety presentation devised by the Road Safety Unit at Dublin Castle formed the basis for each seminar. In addition, students received a number of presentations on topics such as driving licences, modified vehicles, and forensic collision investigation. Since October 2014, Mr. Barry Murphy, guest speaker from Thurles, himself a survivor of a horrific road traffic collision, has given up his free time assisting Gardaí in providing students

with his firsthand experience of his traffic collision and his recovery.

The most recent Divisional Road Safety Seminar was held on 24th April 2015 at the Garda College, Templemore, and on this occasion was run in conjunction with Tipp FM's Road Safety Week.

Assistant Commissioner Jack Nolan, Kilkenny, and Chief Superintendent Kehoe officially launched the 'Tipperary Safer Driving Initiative'. The concept which was devised by Inspector E Golden was coordinated by Garda Regina McCarthy, and Garda Niamh Dooley, Divisional Traffic Corps, offered each student the opportunity to sign a certificate of undertaking to play an active role in keeping the roads in Tipperary safe.

The Tipperary Safer Driving Initiative incorporates six components namely;

1. Obey the Rules of the Road
2. Be Observant
3. Buckle Up (seatbelt)
4. Obey speed limits
5. No mobile phones and
6. No alcohol /drugs

Following consultation with school Principals, who have fully supported the Divisional initiative, the certificate now forms part of each student's school record and has affirmed that

students are willing to make a positive contribution to their road safety and that of other road users.

The school year 2014/2015 saw a total of five road safety seminars take place across the Division. To date, in excess of 1,000 Transition Year Students have taken part in our Divisional Road Safety Programme and Tipperary Safer Driving Initiative.

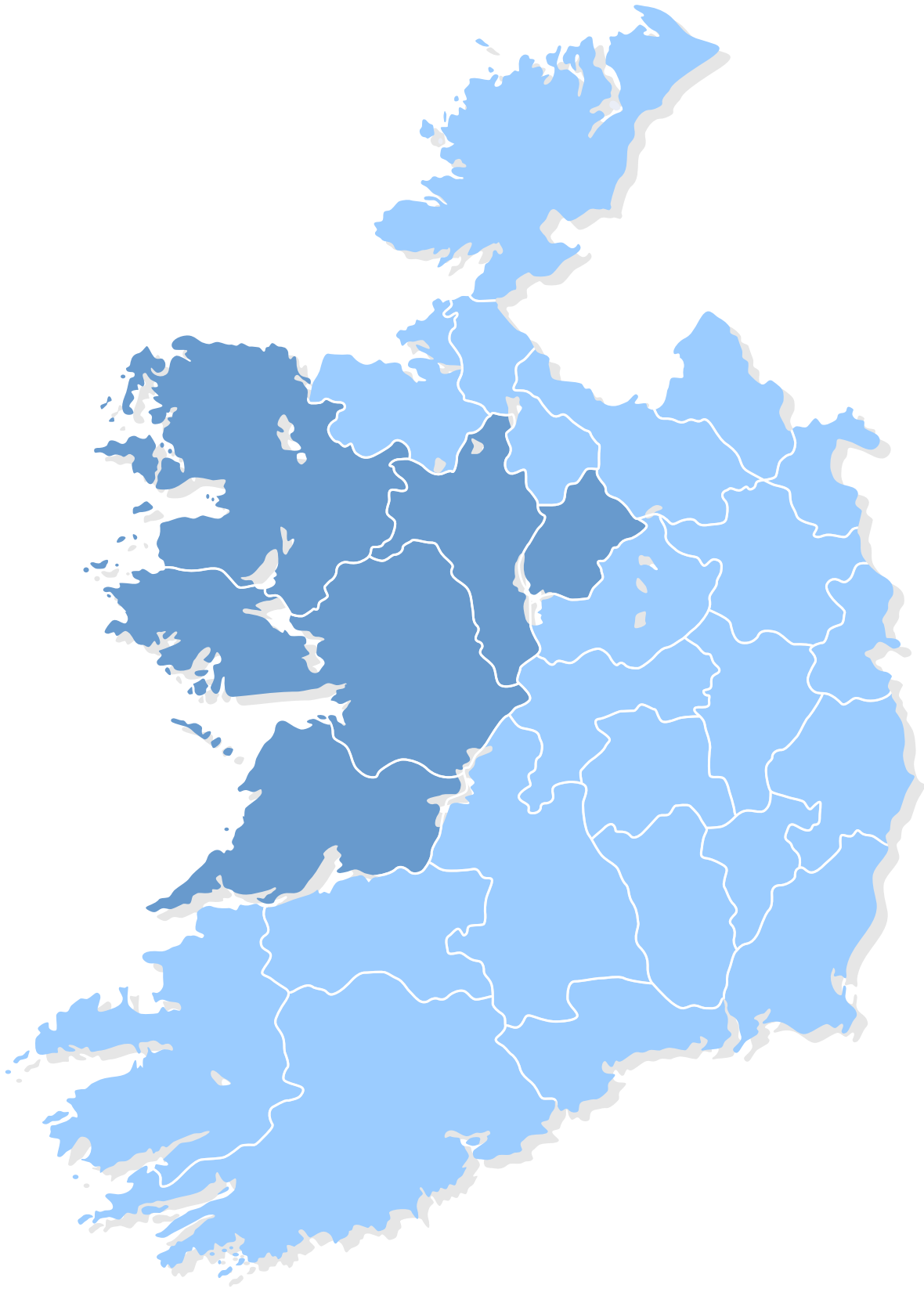
The pack also included: a police badge, colouring pencils, sharpener, emergency whistle, high visibility items, etc.

Longford Top Gear Project

The Longford Top Gear Project is an initiative which was set up by the Longford Community Policing Unit. The concept for the Top Gear Project came about when Garda Kenneth Duggan, Longford Community Policing, sought the help from Sergeant Alan Keane at the National Community Policing Office (NCPO), Garda Community Relations Bureau. Garda Duggan sought to run a project for young people in his area. He wanted to do something new and interesting that would hold their attention, so he sought advice from the NCPO on new projects or good practice.

From Sergeant Keane's involvement with CEPOL, and contact with the Community Policing Sergeant at Devon and Cornwall Police Service, he was aware of a UK police operated programme called "Steer Clear". The initiative involves using remote controlled cars as a team building exercise, along with road safety lessons, youth crime diversion, and positive police engagement. Details and support material of the programme were given to Garda Duggan as a base to formulate the Longford Top Gear Project.

The project is a Model Car building course that takes place over a period of 8 weeks. The cars are Remote Control cars which are taken apart by the students, and then fully rebuilt over the 8 weeks.

During the course, a qualified Tutor guides the students in the stripping down and rebuilding process. They are then tutored on how to control, and race the cars. The Community Policing Unit talk

to the students about Road Safety, and Driver Safety, and give guidance to the future road users.

The young people who participate are referred through: the LEAP Project; The Attic Project; Templemichael College; and any other project that works with young people considered to be at risk of leaving school early.

The Attic Project is part of Foroige, while the LEAP project deals with young offenders and is part funded by the Department of Justice. The Community Policing Unit work very closely with these projects. Some of the young people would have been the subject of the Garda Juvenile Diversion Programme.

The aim of this initiative is to encourage young people to stay in education, and to promote positive interaction with Gardaí.

The course is funded by the HSE, the VEC and the LEAP Project. The initial set up was helped along by the VEC and the LEAP Project which involved the purchase of the RC Cars and all of the equipment.
