Re: Freedom of Information Request FOI-000113-2017 Request Refused

Dear Mr Farrell,

I refer to your request, dated 15th March 2017 and received on 16th March 2017 which you have made under the Freedom of Information Act (FOI) 2014 for records held by An Garda Síochána.

Part 1(n) of Schedule 1 of the FOI Act states that An Garda Síochána is listed as a partially included agency "insofar as it relates to administrative records relating to human resources, or finance or procurement matters". Therefore, only administrative records that relate to human resources, finance or procurement shall be considered.

Your request sought:

I wish to request access to the following records that I believe to be held by the An Garda Síochána

A list of all munitions purchased An Garda, including a description of the item, date of purchase, cost and the country of origin from where the purchase was obtained, in tabular form, for 2016, 2015 and 2014.

I have now made a final decision to refuse your request on 12th April 2017. The purpose of this letter is to explain my decision.

1. Findings, particulars and reasons for decision

Details of your request were forwarded to the Finance and Procurement Section within An Garda Síochána who conducted a search of their records relating to your request.

An Garda Síochána is an unarmed police force, however a selected number of members of An Garda Síochána are authorised to carry firearms on duty whenever the need arises.

All members of An Garda Síochána who are authorised to carry firearms must first successfully complete an initial firearms course on the particular firearm required and if required to carry different types of firearms then additional training is required for each type of firearms.

Firearms are issued to authorised members of An Garda Síochána for personal protection and are utilised to repel felonious attacks on themselves and / or other persons.

Each authorised firearms holder of An Garda Síochána must undergo and successfully complete two judgemental live-fire firearms training courses and one firearms training simulator course, on an annual basis.

In addition to authorised firearms holders An Garda Síochána has two specialised firearms units, namely Regional Support Unit (R.S.U.) and Emergency Response Unit (E.R.U.), the members of which have received substantial additional training in firearms and less-lethal options. These units continue to undergo continuous professional development, which includes tactical training.

I advise that I am refusing your request pursuant to section 32(1)(a)(i) and 32(1)(a)(ii) of the Freedom of Information Act 2014, as I am of the opinion that this information can be reasonably expected, if used inappropriately, to prejudice or impair the Garda Organisation operational capabilities. Section 32 of the FOI Act states:

Law enforcement and public safety

32. (1) A head may refuse to grant an FOI request if access to the record concerned could, in the opinion of the head, reasonably be expected to—

(a) prejudice or impair—

- (i) “the prevention, detection or investigation of offences, the apprehension or prosecution of offenders or the effectiveness of lawful methods, systems, plans or procedures employed for the purposes of the matter aforesaid”*
- (ii) “the enforcement of, compliance with or administration of any law”*

The detail sought by you in your request, fundamentally, seeks to identify the operational capabilities of An Garda Síochána with regard to firearms throughout the Garda Organisation. An Garda Síochána has unique functions, as set out in the Garda Síochána Act 2005, of which one is “*protecting the Security of the State*”. I am of the opinion that nothing should jeopardise, impair or prejudice the ability of An Garda Síochána to carry out that function to its fullest capability.

The data sought, if released, would specifically identify the make and models of firearms and accessories available to An Garda Síochána, thereby allowing for criminal elements in society to proactively develop and / or acquire countermeasures to negate the possible effect an armed Garda response may have in any given situation. This, in turn, would diminish effectiveness of the lawful methods employed by An Garda Síochána to prevent and detect offences and apprehend offenders, as set out in section 32(1)(a)(i) of the Freedom of Information Act 2014.

Similarly the identification of costs associated with the purchase of munitions, disaggregated by description, would identify to the general public the response capability of An Garda Síochána. The release of this detailed and specific information creates a risk to individual Gardaí who may be issued with a firearm. The criminal element in society will be able to assess the possible armed response capabilities of Gardaí. It is therefore reasonable to expect that it would impair and prejudice the Organisation’s capability to enforce the Law, as set out in section 32(1)(b)(ii) of the Freedom of Information Act 2014.

I am conscious of the fact that information released under the Freedom of Information Act is, in essence, a release to the public at large. It is my opinion that the release of this information into the public domain via a Freedom of Information request is an unnecessary risk to the law enforcement procedures employed throughout the State and to individual Gardaí, both armed and unarmed.

It is reasonable to believe that this information, merged with other Garda information, readily available in the public domain, could result in an overall picture being developed with regard to the allocation of firearms throughout the Organisation. This would be of benefit to criminal organisations and individual criminals alike.

However, the table below provides the total spend on munitions for 2014, 2015 and 2016.

2. Rights of appeal

You must ensure that your FOI reference number (**FOI-000113-2017**) is included in the payment details.


